P-R-O-C-E-E-D-I-N-G-S 1 2 THE DEPUTY CLERK: CIVIL ACTION 98-1232, UNITED STATES VERSUS MICROSOFT CORPORATION, AND 98-1233, THE STATE 3 OF NEW YORK, ET AL., VERSUS MICROSOFT CORPORATION. 4 5 PHILLIP MALONE, STEPHEN HOUCK AND DAVID BOIES FOR THE PLAINTIFFS. 6 7 JOHN WARDEN, STEVEN HOLLEY, RICHARD UROWSKY AND 8 WILLIAM NEUKOM FOR THE DEFENDANT. 9 THE COURT: COUNSEL, THE FIRST MATTER I WANTED TO 10 TAKE UP WAS THIS MOTION BY THE PLAINTIFFS FOR AN EARLY 11 PRODUCTION OF THE DIRECT TESTIMONY OF THE MICROSOFT 12 WITNESSES. I'VE JUST HANDED YOU A COPY OF YOUR WRITTEN DIRECT 13 14 TESTIMONY IN THIS CASE THAT YOU SIGNED ON OCTOBER 12TH AND 15 THAT HAS PREVIOUSLY BEEN PROVIDED TO THE COURT AND TO 16 COUNSEL FOR MICROSOFT. 17 AT PARAGRAPHS 4 AND 5 OF YOUR DIRECT TESTIMONY, 18 YOU DESCRIBE A VIDEO DEMONSTRATION THAT YOU HAVE PREPARED TO 19 ILLUSTRATE PART OF YOUR TESTIMONY; IS THAT CORRECT? A. YES. 20 Q. COULD YOU JUST BRIEFLY DESCRIBE FOR THE COURT WHAT THIS 21 22 VIDEO DEMONSTRATION WILL SHOW? 23 A. SURE. THE VIDEO SHOWS SOME OF THE RESULTS OF MY 24 ANALYSIS. IN PARTICULAR, IT ILLUSTRATES THE REMOVABILITY OF 25 INTERNET EXPLORER FROM VARIOUS VERSIONS OF WINDOWS,

1 INCLUDING WINDOWS 98.

2 AND IT SHOWS WHAT HAPPENS WHEN A USER, AFTER 3 REMOVING INTERNET EXPLORER FROM WINDOWS 98, TRIES TO USE 4 ALTERNATIVE BROWSER, NETSCAPE NAVIGATOR, TO BROWSE THE 5 WEAPON. MR. MALONE: YOUR HONOR, GOVERNMENT EXHIBIT 1202 6 7 IS A COPY OF THE VIDEOTAPE DEMONSTRATION PROFESSOR FELTEN 8 HAS JUST DESCRIBED. PURSUANT TO PARAGRAPHS 5-B AND C OF 9 PRETRIAL ORDER NUMBER 2, WE PROVIDED COUNSEL FOR MICROSOFT 10 WITH A COPY OF THE VIDEOTAPE LAST FRIDAY MORNING. 11 AND AT THIS TIME, I WOULD MOVE THE ADMISSION OF 12 EXHIBIT 1202 INTO EVIDENCE, AND ALSO PROVIDE A COPY TO THE 13 COURT. 14 MR. THIS VIDEO DEMONSTRATES THE RESULTS OF MY 21 22 STUDY OF WINDOWS AND IE AND WINDOWS AND NAVIGATOR. IN THIS

5 SECOND, CAN WEB BROWSING WITH IE 4 BE REMOVED FROM
6 WINDOWS 95? THE ANSWER WILL AGAIN BE YES.

7 THIRD, CAN WEB BROWSING WITH IE 4 BE REMOVED FROM
8 WINDOWS 98? THE ANSWER WILL AGAIN BE YES.

9 FINALLY, CAN YOU REPLACE IE 4 WITH NETSCAPE
10 NAVIGATOR TO BROWSE THE WEB IN WINDOWS 98? THE ANSWER IS
11 YES. AND I WILL COMPARE THE EFFECT ON THE USER OF SUCH A
12 REPLACEMENT IN WINDOWS 98.

13 THE COURT MAY RECALL FROM THE CASE FILED BY THE 14 D.O.J. LAST FALL THAT A VERSION OF WINDOWS 95 SHIPPED TO 15 P.C. MANUFACTURERS OR OEM'S CAME BUNDLED WITH INTERNET 16 EXPLORER 3 ON THE SAME DISK. OEM'S RECEIVED THIS VERSION OF 17 WINDOWS 95, KNOWN AS OEM SERVICE RELEASE 2 OR OSR 2, IN 18 AUGUST 1996.

19THIS IS A PICTURE OF THE WINDOWS 95 OSR 2 DESKTOP20SCREEN. YOU CAN SEE THE IE 3 ICON ON THE LEFT-HAND SIDE,21THE GLOBE TITLED "THE INTERNET." DOUBLE-CLICKING ON THIS22ICON WILL LAUNCH IE 3 AND THE USER WILL BE BROWSING THE WEB.23MICROSOFT PROVIDED OTHER WAYS FOR A USER TO LAUNCH24IE 3 TO BROWSE THE WEB. FOR EXAMPLE, YOU CAN ACCESS IE25THROUGH THE START MENU HERE IN THE BOTTOM LEFT-HAND CORNER.

1 CHOOSE THE PROGRAMS FOLDER WHICH LISTS PROGRAMS INSTALLED ON

2 THE COMPUTER AND YOU CAN SEE THE ENTRY FOR INTERNET

3 EXPLORER.

ANOTHER WAY OF LAUNCHING IE IS THROUGH THE WINDOWS
HELP SYSTEM. YOU CAN ACCESS THE HELP SYSTEM BY
DOUBLE-CLICKING ON "MY COMPUTER," AS I AM DOING HERE, AND
CHOOSING THE HELP MENU AND SELECTING "HELP TOPICS." THE TOP
ENTRY I HAVE HIGHLIGHTED IN "HELP TOPICS" IS CALLED
"WINDOWS, THE WEB, AND YOU." LET'S MAGNIFY THAT.

THIS PARTICULAR HELP TOPIC POINTS THE BROWSER TO A
 SPECIFIC WEB SITE ON THE INTERNET THAT HAS BEEN CHOSEN BY
 MICROSOFT. CLICKING ON IT WILL LAUNCH IE 3.

13 FROM THE START MENU, YOU SELECT THE SETTINGS
14 FOLDER AND THEN CLICK ON "CONTROL PANEL." DOUBLE-CLICKING
15 ON THE "ADD/REMOVE PROGRAMS" ICON GIVES YOU THE ADD/REMOVE
16 CONTROL PANEL. THIS CONTROL PANEL CAN BE USED TO REMOVE ANY
17 APPLICATION INSTALLED ON THE P.C. FOR EXAMPLE, MICROSOFT
18 OFFICE SUITE IS INSTALLED ON THIS P.C. AND COULD BE REMOVED
19 BY CLICKING THAT ENTRY. LET'S MAGNIFY THAT.

20 YOU CAN SEE INTERNET EXPLORER 3 LISTED AS ONE OF 21 THE CHOICES THAT CAN BE REMOVED. I SELECT THAT ENTRY AND 22 THEN CLICK ON THE ADD/REMOVE BUTTON. THIS BRINGS UP A 23 DIALOG BOX. LET'S MAGNIFY. THE TEXT IN THE BOX SAYS "THIS 24 WILL REMOVE MICROSOFT INTERNET EXPLORER. DO YOU WISH TO 25 CONTINUE?" I CONFIRM THAT I DO, INDEED, WANT TO REMOVE 1 IE 3. AND LET'S MAGNIFY THE RESULT. IT READS "INTERNET 2 EXPLORER UNINSTALL HAS SUCCESSFULLY COMPLETED."

3 AFTER REBOOTING THE SYSTEM, YOU CAN SEE THAT THE 4 INTERNET ICON HAS NOW DISAPPEARED. AND, IN FACT, ALL THE 5 OTHER WAYS A USER COULD HAVE LAUNCHED IE 3 TO BROWSE THE WEB 6 ARE NO LONGER AVAILABLE. THE IE ENTRY IS GONE FROM THE 7 START MENU PROGRAMS FOLDER.

8 AND IF WE GO BACK TO "MY COMPUTER," AND FIND THE 9 HELP MENU AND HELP TOPICS, CLICKING ON "WINDOWS, THE WEB, 10 AND YOU" BRINGS UP AN ERROR MESSAGE. LET'S MAGNIFY THAT 11 ERROR MESSAGE. IT SAYS THAT "WINDOWS CANNOT FIND OR RUN THE 12 FILE OR PROGRAM NEEDED TO VIEW THE 'WINDOWS, THE WEB, AND 13 YOU' WEB SITE."

14 WHEN IE 4 WAS RELEASED BY MICROSOFT IN SEPTEMBER
15 1997, MICROSOFT GAVE P.C. MANUFACTURERS THE CHOICE OF TAKING
16 A SEPARATE SUPPLEMENTAL DISK WITH IE 4 ON IT. MICROSOFT
17 LATER PUT IE 4 ON THE SAME DISK AS THE WINDOWS OPERATING
18 SYSTEM PRODUCT AND OFFERED THIS DISK TO P.C. MAKERS AS
19 WINDOWS 95, OEM SERVICE RELEASE 2.5 OR OSR 2.5 IN DECEMBER
20 OF 1997.

21 WE ARE NOW LOOKING AT A P.C. THAT HAS OSR 2.5 22 LOADED ON IT. THIS IS THE DESKTOP SCREEN. WINDOWS 95 AND 23 IE 4 GAVE THE USER THE SAME METHODS OF LAUNCHING IE TO 24 BROWSE THE WEB AS DID WINDOWS 95 AND IE 3. HOWEVER, 25 MICROSOFT ADDED A NUMBER OF NEW WAYS OF INITIATING WEB

1 BROWSING USING IE 4. I WILL BRIEFLY DEMONSTRATE SOME OF

2 THEM FOR YOU.

YOU CAN, OF COURSE, LAUNCH IE 4 BY CLICKING ON THE
IE ICON. LET'S MAGNIFY THE ICON. AS YOU CAN SEE, IT IS NOW
THE LETTER "E" RATHER THAN A GLOBE.

6 A NEW METHOD OF LAUNCHING IE 4 IS THROUGH THE 7 "FAVORITES" FOLDER IN THE START MENU. INSIDE IT, THERE IS A 8 SUBFOLDER TITLED "LINKS," WHICH CONTAINS A LIST OF WEB 9 SITES. CHOOSING ONE OF THESE -- LET'S SELECT "BEST OF THE 10 WEB" -- WILL LAUNCH IE 4 AND TAKE US TO THE "BEST OF THE 11 WEB" WEB SITE MAINTAINED BY MICROSOFT.

12 THIS IS SIMILAR TO WHAT WE SAW BEFORE WHEN WE 13 CHOSE THE TOPIC "WINDOWS, THE WEB, AND YOU," OUT OF THE HELP 14 MENU IN OSR 2, IN THAT CLICKING ON THE TOPIC WILL LAUNCH IE 15 AND TAKE YOU TO A PRE-SPECIFIED WEB SITE.

16 ANOTHER NEW WAY TO LAUNCH IE 4 FROM OSR 2.5, WHICH 17 DOES NOT HAVE AN ANALOG IN OSR 2 AND IE 3, IS USING THE 18 CHANNEL BAR ON THE RIGHT-HAND SIDE OF THE OSR 2.5 DESKTOP. 19 CHANNELS ARE SPECIAL WEB SITES THAT ARE DESIGNED TO MEET A SPECIFICATION SET BY MICROSOFT IN THE IE 4 BROWSER. 20 CLICKING ON "SPORTS," FOR EXAMPLE, LAUNCHES IE 4 IN FULL 21 22 SCREEN MODE AND GIVES YOU A SELECTION OF SPORTS-RELATED CHANNELS. CLICKING ON "MSNBC SPORTS" WILL TAKE YOU TO THE 23 24 MSNBC CHANNEL WEB SITE.

25 RELATED TO THE CHANNEL BAR IS THE ACTIVE DESKTOP.

1 THIS IS A FEATURE THAT LETS THE USER DISPLAY WEB DOCUMENTS 2 ON THE BACKGROUND WALLPAPER OF THE DESKTOP. YOU FIRST TURN 3 ON THE ACTIVE DESKTOP BY CLICKING THE RIGHT BUTTON ON YOUR 4 MOUSE. THIS PULLS UP A MENU WITH ACTIVE DESKTOP AS A 5 CHOICE. CHOOSING TO CUSTOMIZE THE DESKTOP WILL GIVE YOU A 6 LIST OF WEB DOCUMENTS YOU CAN PUT ON THE DESKTOP.

7 YOU CAN GO TO THE WEB BY CLICKING ON THE "NEW" 8 BUTTON AND ADD DOCUMENTS TO THE LIST OR SELECT AN EXISTING 9 ONE. I HAVE ALREADY ADDED A DOCUMENT, THE DEPARTMENT OF 10 JUSTICE WEB PAGE. LET'S MAGNIFY THAT. I CHECK THE BOX. I 11 THEN CLICK ON "OKAY" AND I NOW HAVE THE D.O.J. WEB PAGE ON 12 THE DESKTOP.

13 CLICKING ON ANY OF THE LINKS ON THAT WEB PAGE WILL 14 LAUNCH IE 4. THE USER CAN ALSO INITIATE WEB BROWSING OUT OF 15 THE WINDOWS 95 FILE MANAGEMENT SYSTEM KNOWN AS WINDOWS 16 EXPLORER. YOU CAN ACCESS WINDOWS EXPLORER THROUGH THE START 17 MENU BY SELECTING THE PROGRAMS FOLDER AND THEN SELECTING 18 WINDOWS EXPLORER.

19 TYPING A WEB ADDRESS IN THE ADDRESS BAR HERE NEAR
20 THE TOP CAUSES THE WEB PAGE TO APPEAR IN THE EXPLORER
21 WINDOW. IN MY TESTIMONY, I REFER TO THIS LARGE WINDOW AS
22 THE EXPLORER CONTAINER WINDOW AND THIS SUBWINDOW ON THE
23 RIGHT AS AN EMBEDDED SUBWINDOW. YOU CAN THEN USE THE "BACK"
24 AND "FORWARD" BUTTONS TO SWITCH BACK AND FORTH BETWEEN THE
25 WEB PAGE AND YOUR LOCAL FILE DIRECTORIES.

VARIOUS MENUS IN WINDOWS EXPLORER ALSO CONTAIN 1 WAYS OF INITIATING WEB BROWSING. FOR EXAMPLE, LET'S MAGNIFY 2 3 AND SHOW YOU WHAT HAPPENS IF YOU SELECT THE "GO" MENU. 4 THREE OF THE ENTRIES HERE, "HOME PAGE," "CHANNEL GUIDE" AND "SEARCH THE WEB" ARE ALL WEB SITES. CLICKING ON ANY OF THEM 5 WILL LAUNCH IE 4 AND TAKE YOU TO THE SPECIFIED WEB PAGE. 6 7 THE TASK BAR ON THE LOWER EDGE OF THE DESKTOP ALSO 8 CONTAINS MULTIPLE WAYS OF LAUNCHING IE 4. THE "QUICK 9 LAUNCH" BAR, FOR INSTANCE, CONTAINS AN IE ICON. YOU CAN ADD 10 TOOLBARS TO THE TASK BAR. FOR EXAMPLE, THE ADDRESS TOOLBAR. 11 THIS WILL GIVE YOU AN ADDRESS BAR THAT WORKS SIMILARLY TO 12 THE ADDRESS BAR IN WINDOWS EXPLORER UP HERE. YOU CAN TYPE A 13 WEB ADDRESS IN THAT SPACE AND INITIATE WEB BROWSING. 14 THERE ARE AT LEAST A DOZEN MORE WAYS TO LAUNCH

15 IE 4 FROM WINDOWS 95, WHICH ARE GENERALLY SIMILAR TO THE 16 ONES I HAVE ALREADY SHOWN YOU. RATHER THAN CONTINUING TO 17 SHOW YOU EACH OF THESE, LET ME NOW TURN TO THE QUESTION OF 18 WHETHER YOU CAN REMOVE IE 4 FROM WINDOWS 95.

19ALTHOUGH MICROSOFT PUT IE 4 ON THE SAME DISK AS20WINDOWS 95 IN THE OSR 2.5 RELEASE, MICROSOFT CONTINUED TO21PROVIDE A WAY FOR USERS TO REMOVE WEB BROWSING FROM22WINDOWS 95 WITH A TWO-STEP PROCESS USING THE "ADD/REMOVE23PROGRAMS" CONTROL PANEL.

24 REMEMBER, YOU AGAIN LOCATE THE "ADD/REMOVE25 PROGRAMS" CONTROL PANEL OUT OF THE START MENU. DOUBLE-CLICK

ON THE ICON, AND THE "ADD/REMOVE PROGRAMS" CONTROL PANEL 1 APPEARS. LET'S MAGNIFY THE ENTRIES ON THE PANEL. AS YOU 2 3 CAN SEE, IE 4 APPEARS IN THE MENU OF REMOVABLE ITEMS. CLICK 4 THE "ADD/REMOVE" BUTTON AND A DIALOG BOX APPEARS AND GIVES YOU THREE OPTIONS. LET'S MAGNIFY THESE. THE FIRST READS 5 "UNINSTALL INTERNET EXPLORER 4.0 AND ALL ITS COMPONENTS." 6 7 THE SECOND SAYS "ADD A COMPONENT TO INTERNET EXPLORER." AND 8 THE THIRD SAYS "REMOVE THE WINDOWS DESKTOP UPDATE COMPONENT, 9 BUT KEEP THE INTERNET EXPLORER 4.0 WEB BROWSER."

10 WE WANT TO UNINSTALL ALL OF IE 4 AND, THEREFORE, 11 SELECT THE FIRST OPTION. I THEN CLICK "OKAY." A 12 CONFIRMATION BOX APPEARS WITH INSTRUCTIONS. LET'S MAGNIFY THOSE INSTRUCTIONS. THEY READ "CLICK `OKAY' TO REMOVE 13 INTERNET EXPLORER 4.0 AND SHARED COMPONENTS." I CLICK 14 "OKAY" AND GET YET ANOTHER CONFIRMATION SCREEN, WHICH WE CAN 15 MAGNIFY. THIS ONE READS, "ARE YOU SURE YOU WANT TO REMOVE 16 17 MICROSOFT INTERNET EXPLORER 4.0?" AND WE CONFIRM "YES" YET 18 AGAIN, AND THE P.C. BEGINS UNINSTALLING IE 4. AFTER 19 REBOOTING, THIS TAKES YOU BACK TO THE OSR 2 SCENARIO WITH 20 THE IE 3 ICON ON THE DESKTOP AGAIN.

21 YOU THEN FOLLOW THE PROCEDURE I DESCRIBED EARLIER
22 TO REMOVE IE 3, AND THE END RESULT IS WINDOWS 95 OSR 2.5
23 WITH WEB BROWSING REMOVED.

24 NOW LET'S LOOK AT WINDOWS 98. AS IT TURNS OUT,
25 WEB BROWSING IN WINDOWS 98 DIFFERS FROM WEB BROWSING IN

WINDOWS 95 OSR 2.5 ONLY BY THE ADDITION OF TWO NEW WAYS OF
 LAUNCHING IE 4. THE FIRST WAY IS THROUGH WINDOWS HELP. WE
 DOUBLE-CLICK ON "MY COMPUTER" AND GO TO THE HELP MENU, FROM
 WHICH WE SELECT HELP TOPICS. LET'S MAGNIFY THE BUTTONS
 ALONG THE TOP.

6 THE BUTTON ON THE FAR RIGHT SIDE IS TITLED "WEB 7 HELP." CLICKING ON "WEB HELP" WILL BRING UP A DESCRIPTION 8 IN THE RIGHT-HAND WINDOW OF AVAILABLE HELP ONLINE. AT THE 9 END OF THE DESCRIPTION IS A LINK TO SUPPORT ONLINE.

10 CLICKING ON THIS LINK LAUNCHES IE 4 AND YOU ARE TAKEN TO
11 MICROSOFT'S SUPPORT ONLINE WEB PAGE. THIS IS SIMILAR TO THE
12 "WINDOWS, THE WEB, AND YOU" FEATURE I DESCRIBED IN OSR 2.

13 THE SECOND NEW WAY OF LAUNCHING IE 4 IS CALLED
14 "WINDOWS UPDATE." CLICKING ON "WINDOWS UPDATE" IN THE START
15 MENU TAKES YOU TO A MICROSOFT WEB SITE.

16 THIS WEB SITE HELPS THE USER CONFIGURE AND UPDATE 17 THE SOFTWARE ON THE COMPUTER. YOU CAN THEN NAVIGATE TO 18 ANOTHER WEB SITE BY, FOR EXAMPLE, TYPING THE WEB ADDRESS OF 19 THE DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE WEB SITE IN THE ADDRESS BAR. WE 20 END UP AT THE DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE WEB SITE.

ALTHOUGH IE 4 WEB BROWSING IN WINDOWS 98 IS
FUNCTIONALLY VERY SIMILAR TO IE 4 IN OSR 2.5, MICROSOFT NO
LONGER GIVES USERS THE ABILITY TO REMOVE WEB BROWSING FROM
WINDOWS.

25 MY ASSISTANTS AND I SET OUT TO DETERMINE WHETHER

IT IS POSSIBLE TO REMOVE WEB BROWSING FROM WINDOWS 98. WE
 HAVE DETERMINED THAT IT IS POSSIBLE AND HAVE CONSTRUCTED A
 PROTOTYPE THAT SHOWS IT CAN BE DONE.

4 WE ORIGINALLY DEVELOPED OUR PROTOTYPE REMOVAL 5 PROGRAM WITHOUT ACCESS TO MICROSOFT'S SOURCE CODE FOR IE 4 AND WINDOWS 98. THE LATEST VERSION OF OUR PROGRAM IS 6 7 COMPOSED OF ABOUT 600 LINES OF SOFTWARE CODE IN THE FORM OF 8 A NEW SHARED PROGRAM LIBRARY AND MODIFIES TWO OF THE 9 EXISTING SHARED PROGRAM LIBRARIES THAT SHIP WITH WINDOWS 98. 10 IT ALSO REMOVES A NUMBER OF FILES AND DIRECTORIES AND MAKES CHANGES TO THE WINDOWS REGISTRY, WHICH CONTAINS SYSTEM 11 12 CONFIGURATION INFORMATION.

13 THE END RESULT IS A PROTOTYPE THAT PERFORMS 14 SIMILARLY TO THE MICROSOFT IE 3 REMOVAL PROGRAM. WE HAVE 15 DESIGNED OUR PROTOTYPE SO THAT IT CAN BE ACTIVATED FROM THE 16 "ADD/REMOVE PROGRAMS" CONTROL PANEL, AS YOU CAN SEE HERE. 17 LET'S MAGNIFY THAT.

18 HIGHLIGHTING THIS ENTRY AND CLICKING "ADD/REMOVE"
19 WILL INITIATE THE PROGRAM. THE PROGRAM REMOVES ALL THE
20 METHODS BY WHICH THE USER CAN BROWSE THE WEB USING IE. AT
21 THIS POINT, THE USER CAN OPERATE WINDOWS 98 AND RUN
22 APPLICATIONS, BUT THE USER CAN NO LONGER INITIATE WEB
23 BROWSING.

24 NOW LET'S LOOK AT SOME EXAMPLES OF WHAT HAPPENS
25 WHEN THE USER TRIES TO BROWSE THE WEB AFTER OUR PROGRAM HAS

1 BEEN RUN. FIRST OF ALL, WHEN YOU SEE THE WINDOWS 98

2 DESKTOP, THE IE ICONS AND THE CHANNEL BAR ARE GONE. A USER
3 WHO OPENS THE "FAVORITES" FOLDER IN THE START MENU WILL FIND
4 NO WEB SITE LISTING IN THE "LINKS" SUBFOLDER.

5 FOCUSING ON THE DESKTOP, IF YOU RIGHT-CLICK ON THE 6 DESKTOP, THERE IS NO LONGER THE OPTION OF TURNING ON "ACTIVE 7 DESKTOP," THE FEATURE THAT LETS YOU PUT WEB PAGES ON THE 8 DESKTOP.

9 IF YOU OPEN WINDOWS EXPLORER THROUGH THE START 10 MENU AND TYPE A WEB SITE ADDRESS IN THE ADDRESS BAR, YOU 11 WILL NOT BE ABLE TO GO TO THAT WEB SITE. INSTEAD, AN ERROR 12 MESSAGE WILL COME UP. LET'S MAGNIFY THE MESSAGE. IT READS 13 "UNABLE TO OPEN THIS INTERNET SHORTCUT. THE PROTOCOL HTTP 14 DOES NOT HAVE A REGISTERED PROGRAM." THAT BASICALLY MEANS 15 THAT THE SYSTEM DOES NOT KNOW HOW TO OPEN UP WEB SITES.

16 SIMILARLY, UNDER THE "GO" MENU, CHOOSING "HOME
17 PAGE," "SEARCH THE WEB" OR "CHANNEL GUIDE" WILL RESULT IN
18 THE SAME ERROR MESSAGE.

19 FINALLY, FOCUSING ON THE NEW FEATURES IN
20 WINDOWS 98, WINDOWS HELP NO LONGER INCLUDES THE ABILITY TO
21 BROWSE THE WEB USING THE WEB HELP BUTTON. CLICKING ON THE
22 WEB HELP BUTTON, FOLLOWED BY THE SUPPORT ONLINE LINK, GIVES
23 THE SAME ERROR MESSAGE AS BEFORE.

24 WINDOWS UPDATE, THE SYSTEM MAINTENANCE FEATURE,
25 CONTINUES TO LET USERS UPDATE THEIR SYSTEM SOFTWARE.

HOWEVER, THE USER CANNOT BROWSE THE WEB, BUT MUST REMAIN ON
 THE WINDOWS UPDATE WEB SITE. AS YOU CAN SEE, TYPING IN
 ANOTHER WEB ADDRESS BRINGS UP THE SAME ERROR MESSAGE.

4 THE PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM WE DEVELOPED DOES 5 NOT PREVENT WINDOWS 98 FROM BOOTING UP PROPERLY, NOR DOES IT APPEAR TO AFFECT THE STABILITY OF WINDOWS 98 UNDER NORMAL 6 7 USE. ALTHOUGH WE DID NOT TEST OUR PROTOTYPE ON EVERY 8 CONCEIVABLE HARDWARE AND SOFTWARE CONFIGURATION, THE 9 PROTOTYPE DOES SHOW THAT MICROSOFT SHOULD BE CAPABLE OF 10 DEVELOPING A PROCEDURE FOR REMOVING WEB BROWSING FROM 11 WINDOWS 98 WITHOUT ENDANGERING THE NON-WEB BROWSING 12 FUNCTIONALITY OF THE OPERATING SYSTEM.

13 A USER WHO IS GIVEN A COPY OF WINDOWS 98, FROM WHICH WEB BROWSING HAS BEEN REMOVED USING OUR PROTOTYPE 14 REMOVAL PROGRAM, MAY WANT TO ADD A WEB BROWSER TO THE 15 SYSTEM. THE USER COULD, OF COURSE, SELECT IE AND REINSTALL 16 17 IT. WE HAVE DEVELOPED A PROTOTYPE IE INSTALLER FOR 18 WINDOWS 98 THAT ACCOMPLISHES THIS. OR THE USER MAY CHOOSE 19 TO INSTALL THE LATEST VERSION OF IE; THAT IS CURRENTLY IE 5 BETA 1. ALTERNATIVELY, THE USER MAY WANT TO CHOOSE THE 20 NETSCAPE NAVIGATOR WEB BROWSER. 21

THE LAST TOPIC I WISH TO DISCUSS IS WHAT HAPPENS TO THE WINDOWS 98 USER WHO CHOOSES NAVIGATOR. PRESENTLY, NETSCAPE NAVIGATOR CAN BE INSTALLED ON WINDOWS 98 ALONG WITH IE. BUT WINDOWS 98 PERMITS NAVIGATOR TO REPLACE IE FOR ONLY

SOME OF THE WEB BROWSING SITUATIONS DESCRIBED EARLIER. EVEN
 IF THE USER MAKES NAVIGATOR THE DEFAULT BROWSER -- THAT IS,
 THE BROWSER THAT THE SYSTEM IS CONFIGURED TO LAUNCH WHENEVER
 THE USER WANTS TO BROWSE THE WEB -- WINDOWS 98 STILL
 LAUNCHES IE RATHER THAN NAVIGATOR IN SOME WEB BROWSING
 SITUATIONS.

HOWEVER, AFTER OUR PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM HAS
BEEN RUN, THE USER CAN INSTALL NAVIGATOR AND MAKE IT THE
DEFAULT BROWSER SO THAT WINDOWS 98 LAUNCHES NAVIGATOR
WHENEVER THE USER WANTS TO BROWSE THE WEB. THE RESULT IS
THAT THE WINDOWS 98 USER EXPERIENCES WEB BROWSING WITH
NAVIGATOR IN A SUBSTANTIALLY SIMILAR MANNER TO WEB BROWSING
WITH IE.

LET ME SHOW YOU SOME EXAMPLES OF THIS. WE NOW SEE 14 15 THE WINDOWS 98 DESKTOP AFTER NAVIGATOR HAS BEEN INSTALLED. A NAVIGATOR ICON APPEARS WHERE THE IE ICON USED TO BE. 16 17 LET'S MAGNIFY THAT. CLICKING ON THIS ICON WILL LAUNCH NAVIGATOR. WE CAN ALSO GO TO THE FAVORITES FOLDER IN THE 18 19 START MENU TO LOOK AT THE LIST OF WEB SITES STORED IN THE "LINKS" SUBFOLDER. THAT SUBFOLDER NOW PROVIDES NAVIGATOR'S 20 LIST OF FAVORITE WEB SITES. CLICKING ON ONE OF THESE --21 22 LET'S CHOOSE THE WEATHER CHANNEL -- WILL AGAIN LAUNCH 23 NAVIGATOR.

24 WE CAN ALSO LOOK AT THE WINDOWS EXPLORER FILE25 MANAGEMENT PROGRAM. PREVIOUSLY, IF YOU TYPED IN A WEB

ADDRESS IN THE ADDRESS BAR, IE WOULD LAUNCH TO DISPLAY THE
 WEB PAGE. THE SYSTEM NOW LAUNCHES NAVIGATOR TO DISPLAY THE
 WEB PAGE. YOU CAN CLICK BACK AND FORTH BETWEEN THE TWO
 WINDOWS TO LOOK AT YOUR LOCAL FILES AND FOLDERS OR WEB
 PAGES.

6 WE CAN ALSO BRING BACK THE ADDRESS TOOLBAR LOCATED
7 ON THE TASK BAR ALONG THE BOTTOM EDGE OF THE DESKTOP.
8 TYPING A WEB ADDRESS IN THIS ADDRESS BAR ALSO LAUNCHES
9 NAVIGATOR.

10 WINDOWS HELP ALSO WORKS WITH NAVIGATOR. WE ACCESS 11 HELP BY DOUBLE-CLICKING ON "MY COMPUTER," SELECTING THE HELP 12 MENU AND CHOOSING HELP TOPICS. CLICKING ON THE "WEB HELP" 13 BUTTON AGAIN DISPLAYS THE DISCUSSION OF ONLINE HELP. AND 14 CLICKING THE "SUPPORT ONLINE" LINK AT THE BOTTOM NOW 15 LAUNCHES NAVIGATOR INSTEAD OF IE.

WINDOWS UPDATE CONTINUES TO OPERATE BY USING 16 17 CERTAIN SHARED PROGRAM LIBRARIES SHIPPED WITH WINDOWS 98 18 THAT ARE LEFT INTACT BY OUR PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM. WE 19 COULD HAVE DESIGNED OUR PROGRAM TO ALLOW NAVIGATOR TO LAUNCH WHEN THE USER CLICKS ON "WINDOWS UPDATE." HOWEVER, 20 MICROSOFT HAS STRUCTURED THE WINDOWS UPDATE WEB SITE TO 21 22 REFUSE ACCESS TO ANY NON-MICROSOFT WEB BROWSER, SUCH AS 23 NAVIGATOR.

24 MICROSOFT COULD HAVE DESIGNED THE WINDOWS UPDATE 25 WEB SITE SO THAT IT WOULD FUNCTION EQUIVALENTLY, WHETHER

VISITED BY A MICROSOFT OR A NON-MICROSOFT BROWSER. AS YOU
 WILL RECALL, PREVIOUSLY IN WINDOWS 98 WITH WEB BROWSING
 REMOVED, ATTEMPTING TO LEAVE THE WINDOWS UPDATE WEB SITE
 WOULD RESULT IN AN ERROR MESSAGE. NOW, IN WINDOWS 98 WITH
 NAVIGATOR INSTALLED, ATTEMPTING TO LEAVE THE WINDOWS UPDATE
 WEB SITE WILL LAUNCH NAVIGATOR TO VIEW THE NEW SITE.

AS YOU CAN SEE, IE IS NOT THE ONLY WAY TO SUPPORT
8 WEB BROWSING IN WINDOWS 98. NAVIGATOR CAN SUCCESSFULLY
9 REPLACE IE IN A MANNER THAT SUBSTANTIALLY DUPLICATES IE'S
10 WEB BROWSING BEHAVIOR IN WINDOWS 98.

11 IN THIS VIDEO, I HAVE ADDRESSED FOUR ISSUES. 12 FIRST, CAN YOU REMOVE IE 3 WEB BROWSING FROM WINDOWS 95? 13 THE ANSWER IS YES, AND MICROSOFT HAS PROVIDED THE MECHANISM 14 FOR DOING SO OUT OF THE "ADD/REMOVE PROGRAMS" CONTROL PANEL. SECOND, CAN IE 4 WEB BROWSING BE REMOVED FROM 15 WINDOWS 95? THE ANSWER IS YES, AND, AGAIN, MICROSOFT HAS 16 17 PROVIDED THE MECHANISM FOR DOING SO OUT OF THE "ADD/REMOVE 18 PROGRAMS" CONTROL PANEL.

19 THIRD, CAN YOU REMOVE IE WEB BROWSING FROM
20 WINDOWS 98? THE ANSWER, AGAIN, IS YES. ALTHOUGH MICROSOFT
21 HAS NOT PROVIDED A MECHANISM FOR DOING SO, OUR PROTOTYPE
22 REMOVAL PROGRAM DEMONSTRATES THAT IT IS POSSIBLE.

FINALLY, CAN NAVIGATOR REPLACE IE FOR WEB BROWSING
FROM WINDOWS 98? THE ANSWER, AGAIN, IS YES, ALTHOUGH
MICROSOFT HAS NOT PROVIDED A MECHANISM THAT ENABLES COMPLETE

1 SUBSTITUTION OF NAVIGATOR FOR IE IN WINDOWS 98. INSTALLING

2 NAVIGATOR, AFTER RUNNING OUR PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM,

3 DEMONSTRATES THAT THIS IS POSSIBLE.

4 FURTHERMORE, THE USER'S WEB BROWSING EXPERIENCE
5 AFTER DOING THIS SUBSTANTIALLY DUPLICATES WHAT THE USER
6 EXPERIENCES WITH WINDOWS 98 AND IE.

7 (END OF PLAYING OF VIDEOTAPE.)

8 BY MR. MALONE:

9 Q. PROFESSOR FELTEN, DO YOU AFFIRM UNDER OATH THE TRUTH OF 10 THE TESTIMONY IN YOUR WRITTEN STATEMENT AND IN THE VIDEOTAPE 11 DEMONSTRATION THAT WE JUST SAW?

12 A. YES. THERE ARE TWO MINOR EVENTS THAT HAVE OCCURRED

13 SINCE I SUBMITTED MY TESTIMONY, WHICH I WOULD HAVE INCLUDED

14 IN MY TESTIMONY HAD THEY OCCURRED BEFORE IT WAS SUBMITTED,

15 BUT NEITHER OF THESE AFFECTS MY TESTIMONY IN ANY SIGNIFICANT

- 16 WAY.
- 17 Q. THANK YOU.

18 MR. MALONE: YOUR HONOR, I TENDER THE WITNESS FOR19 CROSS-EXAMINATION.

20 THE COURT: ALL RIGHT.

21 MR. HEINER: GOOD MORNING, YOUR HONOR.

22 THE COURT: GOOD MORNING.

23 CROSS-EXAMINATION

24 BY MR. HEINER:

25 Q. GOOD MORNING, DR. FELTEN.

1 A. GOOD MORNING.

2 Q. MY NAME IS DAVE HEINER, AS YOU KNOW, AND I WILL BE 3 QUESTIONING YOU TODAY ON BEHALF OF MICROSOFT. 4 Q. ON THE VIDEOTAPE WE JUST SAW, YOU DEMONSTRATED THE 5 EFFECTS OF RUNNING YOUR SO-CALLED PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM ON WINDOWS 98, RIGHT? 6 7 A. YES. 8 Q. AND ONE OF THE EFFECTS WAS THAT IF A USER WOULD TYPE THE 9 ADDRESS FOR A WEB SITE INTO ANY ADDRESS BAR IN WINDOWS 98, 10 AFTER THE PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM IS RUN, WINDOWS WOULD 11 DISPLAY AN ERROR MESSAGE; IS THAT RIGHT? 12 A. THAT'S CORRECT. Q. NOW, IN WINDOWS 98, THE WAY MICROSOFT DESIGNED THE 13 14 PRODUCT, WINDOWS WOULD ORDINARILY DISPLAY THE WEB PAGE, 15 RIGHT? 16 A. THAT'S CORRECT. 17 Q. AND MR. WEADOCK TESTIFIED PREVIOUSLY ABOUT WHY IT IS 18 THAT USERS -- OR AT LEAST SOME USERS -- WOULD WANT TO HAVE 19 NO WEB BROWSING ON THEIR SYSTEMS. YOU WOULD AGREE WITH ME, WOULD YOU NOT, THAT MANY 20 USERS, WHEN THEY TYPE THE ADDRESS FOR A WEB SITE INTO AN 21 22 ADDRESS BAR, WOULD PREFER TO SEE THE WEB SITE RATHER THAN AN 23 ERROR MESSAGE? 24 A. ABSOLUTELY. AND THE PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM GIVES THE 25 USER THE CHOICE TO USE WHICHEVER WEB BROWSER THEY WANT,

INCLUDING IE 4. IF THEY WANT TO USE IE 4, THEY CAN SIMPLY
 NOT RUN THE PROTOTYPE OR, HAVING RUN IT, THEY COULD SIMPLY
 DOUBLE-CLICK THE PROTOTYPE INSTALLATION PROGRAM THAT WE
 PROVIDE.

5 THE IDEA HERE IS NOT TO TAKE AWAY THE USER'S 6 CHOICE TO USE IE 4. IT'S TO RESTORE THE CHOICE TO HAVE NO 7 WEB BROWSER OR TO USE AN ALTERNATIVE BROWSER.

8 Q. NOW, DR. FELTEN, EVEN WITHOUT RUNNING ANY PROTOTYPE 9 REMOVAL PROGRAM, THERE IS NO PROBLEM INSTALLING NETSCAPE 10 NAVIGATOR AND RUNNING IT ON WINDOWS 98; ISN'T THAT RIGHT? 11 A. THERE'S NO PROBLEM INSTALLING IT, BUT THERE IS A PROBLEM 12 USING IT. AND PROFESSOR FARBER DESCRIBED THIS THE OTHER 13 DAY. HE TALKED ABOUT WHAT HAPPENED WHEN HE TRIED TO INSTALL NAVIGATOR ON HIS WINDOWS 98 P.C. AND IE KEPT POPPING UP IN 14 HIS FACE, AS HE PUT IT. THAT'S THE SORT OF PHENOMENON THAT 15 16 I REFER TO IN MY TESTIMONY AS HARDCODING ACCESS TO IE 4. 17 AND SO THAT HARDCODING DOES PREVENT THE USER FROM USING 18 NETSCAPE NAVIGATOR IN ALL THE CASES WHERE THEY WOULD LIKE 19 TO.

Q. DR. FELTEN, ISN'T IT THE CASE THAT MILLIONS OF PEOPLE
ARE RUNNING NETSCAPE NAVIGATOR ON WINDOWS 98 TODAY WITHOUT
INCIDENT?

A. I HAVE NO BASIS FOR EVALUATING THAT ONE WAY OR THEOTHER.

25 Q. AND YOU TESTIFIED IN THE VIDEOTAPE THAT THERE ARE -- I

1 THINK YOU SAID PERHAPS TWO DOZEN WAYS, OR MORE, TO INITIATE

2 WEB BROWSING IN WINDOWS 98; ISN'T THAT RIGHT?

3 A. YES.

Q. AND ISN'T IT TRUE, DR. FELTEN, THAT IF A USER INSTALLS
NETSCAPE NAVIGATOR AS THE DEFAULT BROWSER ON WINDOWS 98, ALL
BUT TWO OF THOSE WAYS TURN INTO WAYS IN WHICH, WHEN A USER
CLICKS ON THAT METHOD, NAVIGATOR WILL BE LAUNCHED?
A. NO, I BELIEVE THERE ARE FOUR CASES IN WHICH NAVIGATOR IS

9 NOT LAUNCHED, AS DESCRIBED IN MY TESTIMONY. THERE'S A LIST

10 IN MY DIRECT TESTIMONY.

11 Q. FOUR OUT OF MORE THAN TWO DOZEN; IS THAT RIGHT?

12 A. THAT'S RIGHT. AND THOSE FOUR CAN BE QUITE SIGNIFICANT

13 TO A USER, AS PROFESSOR FARBER TESTIFIED.

14 Q. AND THERE MAY BE IMPORTANT DESIGN CONSIDERATIONS, MIGHT15 THERE NOT, WHY IN THOSE FOUR CASES IE WOULD BE LAUNCHED

16 RATHER THAN NAVIGATOR?

17 A. HAVING STUDIED IE AND STUDIED WINDOWS 98, INCLUDING
18 STUDYING THE SOURCE CODE, AND HAVING EXPERIENCE WITH USING
19 THE PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM WHICH CHANGES THE BEHAVIOR IN
20 THOSE CASES, I KNOW OF NO REASON WHY MICROSOFT WAS

21 TECHNOLOGICALLY COMPELLED TO DESIGN THINGS THAT WAY.

22 Q. IN THOSE FOUR CASES?

23 A. IN ANY CASE. I KNOW OF NO REASON WHY MICROSOFT SHOULD

24 TAKE AWAY THE USER'S CHOICE OF BROWSER IN ANY CASE.

25 Q. WE'LL COME BACK TO THIS SUBJECT LATER ON IN THE

EXAMINATION. YOU WILL AGREE WITH ME, THOUGH, THAT ANY USER 1 CAN INSTALL NETSCAPE AND RUN IT ON WINDOWS 98? THERE IS NO 2 3 LACK OF CHOICE IN THAT REGARD. A. THEY CAN INSTALL IT, BUT, AS I SAID, THEY CANNOT RUN IT 4 5 IN ALL CASES IN WHICH THEY WOULD LIKE TO. Q. NOW, DR. FELTEN, THIS IS BECOMING CONFUSING. INSTALL 6 7 NETSCAPE ON A WINDOWS 98 MACHINE WITHOUT ANY PROTOTYPE 8 REMOVAL PROGRAM, MAKE A DECISION, I WOULD LIKE TO BROWSE THE 9 WEB -- THEY CAN DO THAT USING NETSCAPE; ISN'T THAT RIGHT? 10 THERE'S TWO DOZEN WAYS TO DO THAT USING NETSCAPE. 11 A. THERE ARE WAYS TO DO IT, BUT THERE ARE ALSO SITUATIONS 12 WHERE IE POPS UP WHEN A USER DOES NOT WANT IT. THAT'S WHAT 13 PROFESSOR FARBER EXPERIENCED. AND IF SOMEONE WHO KNOWS AS MUCH ABOUT SOFTWARE AS HE DOES WAS STILL CONFUSED AND, IN 14

FACT, WENT BACK TO USING IE BECAUSE HE FOUND THIS TOO 16 DIFFICULT, THAT SHOWS THAT THE AVERAGE USER IS NOT IN A GOOD 17 SITUATION HERE.

18 Q. YOU HAVE BEEN RETAINED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE TO 19 TESTIFY AS AN EXPERT IN THIS MATTER; IS THAT RIGHT?

20 A. YES.

15

Q. WHEN DID YOU BEGIN WORKING WITH THE DEPARTMENT OF 21 22 JUSTICE ON THIS CASE?

A. I BELIEVE THE CONTRACT WAS SIGNED IN LATE JANUARY OR 23 24 EARLY FEBRUARY.

25 Q. AND SINCE THAT TIME, YOU HAVE STUDIED WINDOWS AND ITS

- 1 WEB BROWSING FUNCTIONALITY; IS THAT RIGHT?
- 2 A. YES. AMONG OTHER THINGS.

3 Q. AND ONE OF THE THINGS YOU DID WAS TO STUDY THE SOURCE4 CODE FOR WINDOWS 98, RIGHT?

5 A. YES. I RECEIVED THE SOURCE CODE ON THE 9TH OF AUGUST.

6 Q. AS FAR AS YOU KNOW, YOU ARE THE ONLY GOVERNMENT WITNESS

7 WHO HAS STUDIED THE SOURCE CODE FOR WINDOWS 98, CORRECT?

8 A. AS FAR AS I KNOW, YES.

9 Q. AND YOU HAVE BEEN ASKED BY THE DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE TO
10 PROVIDE YOUR EXPERT OPINION ON THE RELATIONS BETWEEN WINDOWS
11 AND INTERNET EXPLORER, AS YOU PUT IT IN YOUR WRITTEN

- 12 TESTIMONY, CORRECT?
- 13 A. YES.

14 Q. YOU UNDERSTAND, SIR, DO YOU NOT, THAT IN THIS CASE, THE 15 DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE IS ALLEGING THAT WINDOWS AND INTERNET 16 EXPLORER ARE SEPARATE PRODUCTS?

17 A. YES.

18 Q. IN YOUR EXPERT OPINION, HOWEVER, INTERNET EXPLORER 4 IS 19 PART OF THE PRODUCT THAT MICROSOFT CALLS WINDOWS 98; ISN'T 20 THAT RIGHT?

A. INTERNET EXPLORER IS PART OF THE DISTRIBUTION WHICH
MICROSOFT SELLS UNDER THE NAME WINDOWS 98. HOWEVER, THEIR
INTERNET EXPLORER IS AN APPLICATION WHICH CAN BE SEPARATED
FROM WINDOWS 98.

25 Q. MY QUESTION FOR THE MOMENT DOESN'T RELATE TO

REMOVABILITY, OR SEPARATION, OR ANYTHING OF THAT SORT. I'M
 SIMPLY ASKING, THERE IS A PRODUCT CALLED WINDOWS 98 AND YOUR
 EXPERT OPINION IS THAT INTERNET EXPLORER 4 IS PART OF THAT
 PRODUCT; ISN'T THAT RIGHT?

5 A. YOU HAVE TO BE CAREFUL HERE TO DISTINGUISH BETWEEN QUESTIONS OF DESIGN AND QUESTIONS OF PACKAGING. MICROSOFT 6 7 SELLS A SINGLE PACKAGE WHICH CONTAINS WINDOWS 98 AND 8 INTERNET EXPLORER TOGETHER, AND IT SELLS IT UNDER THE NAME 9 "WINDOWS 98." BUT THERE'S NO REASON, BASED ON THE STRUCTURE 10 OF THE SOFTWARE -- THERE'S NO REASON BASED ON THE WAY USERS 11 EXPERIENCE IT TO THINK THAT USERS THINK OF THEM AS THE SAME 12 PRODUCT. THE USERS THINK OF OPERATING SYSTEM PRODUCTS AND WEB BROWSERS AS BEING THE SAME THING. 13

14 Q. I WASN'T ASKING YOU ABOUT WHAT USERS THINK OF, AND 15 YOU'RE NOT AN EXPERT IN MARKETING OR HOW USERS INTERACT WITH 16 P.C.'S; IS THAT RIGHT?

17 A. IT'S NOT A TOPIC I'VE STUDIED, ALTHOUGH I CERTAINLY AM A 18 USER. AND AS A COMPUTER SCIENTIST, A LOT OF PEOPLE TALK TO 19 ME ABOUT THEIR EXPERIENCES IN USING P.C.'S. I ALSO TALK TO PEOPLE IN THE INDUSTRY ABOUT WHAT THEY THINK AND WHAT 20 THEY'RE TRYING TO DO, INCLUDING PEOPLE AT MICROSOFT. 21 22 O. YOU DO AGREE WITH ME THAT INTERNET EXPLORER 4 IS PART OF THE PRODUCT THAT MICROSOFT CALLS WINDOWS 98; IS THAT RIGHT? 23 24 A. THERE'S NO OUESTION THAT IF YOU GO TO THE STORE AND BUY THE BOX THAT CALLS ITSELF WINDOWS 98, IT WILL HAVE INTERNET 25

1 EXPLORER IN IT.

2	Q. OKAY. AND YOU DO NOT STATE ANYPLACE IN YOUR WRITTEN	
3	TESTIMONY THAT YOU HAVE FOUND ANY WAY TO REMOVE INTERNET	
4	EXPLORER 4 FROM WINDOWS 98; ISN'T THAT RIGHT?	
5	A. NO. I THINK THAT'S WHAT THE PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM	
6	DEMONSTRATES THAT MICROSOFT CAN DO.	
7	Q. DO YOU HAVE YOUR TESTIMONY IN FRONT OF YOU?	
8	A. YES, I DO.	
9	Q. CAN YOU SHOW ME WHERE IN YOUR TESTIMONY YOU EXPLAIN HOW	
10	TO REMOVE INTERNET EXPLORER 4 FROM WINDOWS 98?	
11	A. I BELIEVE THAT'S WHAT APPENDIX B IS. IT EXPLAINS WHAT	
12	THE PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM DOES.	
13	Q. SHOW ME IN THE SUBSTANCE OF YOUR TESTIMONY WHERE YOU SAY	
14	YOU CAN REMOVE INTERNET EXPLORER 4 FROM WINDOWS 98?	
15	A. PARAGRAPH 4 SAYS THAT IE WEB BROWSING CAN BE REMOVED	
16	FROM WINDOWS 98.	
17	Q. WEB BROWSING?	
18	A. CORRECT.	
19	Q. I'M ASKING YOU ABOUT THE SOFTWARE CALLED INTERNET	
20	EXPLORER 4, NOT A FUNCTION. WEB BROWSING IS A FUNCTION; IS	
21	THAT RIGHT?	
22	A. WEB BROWSING IS A FUNCTION. IT'S AN ACTIVITY, YES.	
23	Q. OKAY. AND THE PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM IS A METHOD TO	
24	HIDE ACCESS TO THAT ACTIVITY, RIGHT?	
25	A. YES. AND THE IE 4 WEB BROWSER IS A PRODUCT THAT GIVES	

1 THE USER THE ABILITY TO ENGAGE IN THAT ACTIVITY OF WEB

BROWSING. THAT'S WHAT USERS ARE BUYING WHEN THEY BUY A WEB 2 3 BROWSER. THEY ARE BUYING SOMETHING THAT WILL LET THEM BROWSE THE WEB. 4 5 O. OKAY. AND WHAT YOU'RE SAYING IN YOUR TESTIMONY IS THAT YOU FOUND A WAY TO REMOVE THE ABILITY OF USERS TO PERFORM 6 7 THAT FUNCTION IN WINDOWS 98, BUT YOU'RE NOT CLAIMING IN YOUR 8 TESTIMONY THAT YOU HAVE FOUND ANY WAY TO REMOVE THE INTERNET 9 EXPLORER 4 SOFTWARE ITSELF FROM WINDOWS 98; ISN'T THAT 10 RIGHT? 11 A. I DON'T SEE THERE AS BEING MUCH OF A DISTINCTION THERE. 12 IF YOU HAVE REMOVED THE ABILITY TO BROWSE THE WEB, AS FAR AS 13 THE USER IS CONCERNED, WEB BROWSING -- THE WEB BROWSER IS 14 GONE. Q. WELL, DR. FELTEN, YOU WERE VERY CAREFUL TO BE VERY 15 16 PRECISE IN YOUR USE OF LANGUAGE IN YOUR WRITTEN TESTIMONY; 17 ISN'T THAT RIGHT? A. GENERALLY, YES. 18 19 Q. I WOULD LIKE TO DIRECT YOUR ATTENTION TO PAGE 6, PARAGRAPH 21 OF YOUR TESTIMONY. 20 21 A. OKAY. 22 Q. AND THERE YOU SAY IN THE SECOND SENTENCE, "I HAVE 23 DETERMINED THAT REMOVING INTERNET EXPLORER 1 FROM THIS 24 VERSION OF WINDOWS IS EASILY ACCOMPLISHED, " CORRECT? 25 A. YES, THAT'S WHAT I SAID AND IT'S TRUE.

Q. AND I DIRECT YOUR ATTENTION, IF YOU WOULD, TO PARAGRAPH 1 22. AND THERE YOU SAY IN THE SECOND SENTENCE, "I HAVE 2 3 DETERMINED THAT REMOVING IE 2 FROM THIS VERSION OF WINDOWS CAN BE EASILY ACCOMPLISHED"; IS THAT RIGHT? 4 5 A. YES. 6 Q. AND TURNING YOUR ATTENTION TO PARAGRAPH 23, IN THE 7 SECOND SENTENCE, YOU SAY, "THIS VERSION OF IE IS REMOVABLE 8 FROM OSR 2 THROUGH A SIMPLE PROCEDURE"; IS THAT CORRECT? 9 A. YES. 10 Q. NO PLACE IN YOUR TESTIMONY, HOWEVER, DO YOU GO TO THE 11 NEXT STEP AND SAY, "THERE IS A WAY TO REMOVE INTERNET 12 EXPLORER 4 FROM WINDOWS 98"; ISN'T THAT RIGHT? 13 A. AS I EXPLAINED -- I STATED IN THE SUMMARY IN PARAGRAPH 4 AND LATER IN THE MAIN BODY OF THE TESTIMONY THAT THE 14 PROTOTYPE REMOVES WEB BROWSING FROM THE SYSTEM, WHICH IS THE 15 SAME THING. 16 17 Q. AS YOU EXPLAIN IN YOUR WRITTEN TESTIMONY, THE WORLD WIDE 18 WEB IS CHARACTERIZED BY A SET OF STANDARD DATA FORMATS, 19 INCLUDING HTML, AND A SET OF STANDARD COMMUNICATIONS 20 PROTOCOLS, SUCH AS HTTP. DO YOU RECALL THAT TESTIMONY? IT HAPPENS TO BE AT PARAGRAPH 13. 21 A. OKAY. LET ME TAKE A LOOK. YES. IT'S CHARACTERIZED BY 22 THOSE FORMATS AND PROTOCOLS THAT ALLOW COMPUTERS TO SHARE 23 24 WEB PAGES, AND HENCE, ALLOW USERS TO BROWSE THE WEB. 25 Q. AND THE HTML AND HTTP TECHNICAL STANDARDS ARE SUPPORTED

- 1 TO A LARGE EXTENT IN SOFTWARE; IS THAT RIGHT?
- 2 A. YES.
- 3 Q. AN EARLY EXAMPLE OF SUCH SOFTWARE, OF COURSE, WAS THE
- 4 MOSAIC WEB BROWSER, CORRECT?
- 5 A. YES. MOSAIC WAS A WEB BROWSING PROGRAM THAT DID CONTAIN6 THOSE FUNCTIONS.
- 7 Q. AND ANOTHER EARLY WEB BROWSER THAT CONTAINED THOSE
- 8 FUNCTIONS WAS NETSCAPE NAVIGATOR 1.0, CORRECT?
- 9 A. THAT'S CORRECT.
- 10 Q. AND YET ANOTHER ONE WAS INTERNET EXPLORER 1.0, RIGHT?
- 11 A. ACTUALLY, I'M NOT FAMILIAR WITH IE 1.
- 12 Q. YOU'RE NOT FAMILIAR WITH IE 1?
- 13 A. NO.
- 14 Q. OKAY. DO YOU BELIEVE, BASED ON YOUR EXPERIENCE AS A
- 15 COMPUTER SCIENTIST, THAT IE 1 LIKELY INCLUDED THE ABILITY TO
- 16 DISPLAY HTML AND ACCESS DATA VIA HTTP?
- 17 A. YES, IT LIKELY DID.
- 18 Q. NOW, IN FACT, ALL THREE OF THE BROWSERS WE JUST TALKED 19 ABOUT INCLUDED THAT CAPABILITY, ISN'T THAT RIGHT, TO ACCESS 20 DATA VIA HTTP AND DISPLAY IT VIA HTML?
- 21 A. RIGHT. THEY PROVIDED TO THE USER THE ABILITY TO BROWSE22 THE WEB BY USING THAT CODE.
- Q. IN FACT, THE CORE FUNCTION OF A WEB BROWSER IS PRECISELY
 THAT, TO ALLOW PEOPLE TO ACCESS DATA VIA HTTP AND DISPLAY IT
 VIA HTML; ISN'T THAT RIGHT?

A. THE PRIMARY FUNCTION IS TO LET THE USER BROWSE THE WEB.
 IN OTHER WORDS, THE PRIMARY FUNCTION IS DEFINED BY HOW THE
 USER EXPERIENCES THE PRODUCT.

4 Q. AND THE WEB IS DEFINED BY HTML PAGES, IF YOU WILL, AND
5 THE HTTP PROTOCOL; ISN'T THAT RIGHT? YOU JUST TESTIFIED TO
6 THAT A FEW MOMENTS AGO.

7 A. I CHARACTERIZED -- I TESTIFIED THAT THOSE WERE TWO 8 THINGS THAT CHARACTERIZED THE WEB. BUT WEB BROWSING IS 9 CHARACTERIZED BY THE ACTIVITY THAT THE USER ENGAGES IN: 10 LOOKING AT WEB BROWSER WINDOWS, TYPING IN A WEB ADDRESS 11 ANYWHERE ON THE WEB AND GOING THERE, OR CLICKING ON A LINK 12 AND BEING TAKEN TO THE PAGE THAT THE LINK POINTS TO. THOSE 13 ARE THINGS THAT I TESTIFIED CHARACTERIZE WEB BROWSING. 14 O. OKAY.

MR. HEINER: I WOULD LIKE TO PLACE BEFORE THE WITNESS A COPY OF HIS DEPOSITION TAKEN IN THIS MATTER, IF I MAY.

18 BY MR. HEINER:

19 Q. DR. FELTEN, DO YOU RECALL GIVING A DEPOSITION IN THIS
20 CASE?

21 A. YES.

22 Q. I WOULD DIRECT YOUR ATTENTION, SIR, TO PAGE 146 OF THE 23 TRANSCRIPT OF THE DEPOSITION. AND I AM GOING TO READ TO YOU 24 LINES 11 TO 17.

25 A. OKAY.

Q. "QUESTION: IS IT FAIR TO SAY, SIR, THAT THE ABILITY TO 1 2 PARSE AND RENDER HTML IS A CORE FUNCTION OF A WEB BROWSER? 3 "OBJECTION. 4 "ANSWER: IF BY CORE FUNCTION, ' YOU MEAN A 5 FUNCTION WHICH NECESSARILY MUST BE SUPPORTED IF WEB BROWSING 6 FUNCTIONS ARE TO BE PROVIDED, THEN, YES." 7 DO YOU RECALL BEING ASKED THAT QUESTION AND GIVING 8 THAT ANSWER? 9 A. YES. 10 Q. NOW, ANOTHER FUNCTION OF A WEB BROWSER IS TO SERVE AS A 11 PLATFORM; IS THAT RIGHT? A. THAT'S ONE THING A WEB BROWSER DOES. PLENTY OF OTHER 12 13 SOFTWARE PRODUCTS SERVE AS PLATFORMS. FOR EXAMPLE, 14 MICROSOFT OFFICE SERVES AS A PLATFORM. APPLE'S QUICKTIME SERVES AS A PLATFORM, AS DR. TEVANIAN TESTIFIED. AND LOTS 15 16 OF OTHER SOFTWARE ALSO SERVES AS A PLATFORM. 17 Q. AND BY THE TERM "PLATFORM," YOU MEAN SOFTWARE THAT 18 PROVIDES SERVICES TO PROGRAMMERS WHO WRITE OTHER SOFTWARE 19 PROGRAMS, RIGHT? A. YES, THAT'S WHAT THE TERM "PLATFORM" MEANS. 20 Q. SO A WEB BROWSER CAN BE A PLATFORM AND AN OPERATING 21 22 SYSTEM CAN BE A PLATFORM; IS THAT RIGHT? 23 A. YES, AND AN OFFICE SUITE CAN BE A PLATFORM, AND A 24 MULTIMEDIA PLAYER CAN BE A PLATFORM, AND A FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT PROGRAM CAN BE A PLATFORM. I CAN WRITE A 25

1 PLATFORM.

2	Q. ONE EXAMPLE OF A WEB BROWSER THAT IS A PLATFORM IS		
3	NETSCAPE NAVIGATOR, CORRECT?		
4	A. YES, THAT'S ONE OF THE THINGS THAT NAVIGATOR PROVIDES.		
5	Q. NOW, JUST SO WE ARE COMPLETELY CLEAR IN OUR USE OF		
6	LANGUAGE HERE THIS MORNING, YOU AGREE, DO YOU NOT, THAT THE		
7	TERM "WEB BROWSER," "INTERNET BROWSER" AND "INTERNET BROWSER		
8	SOFTWARE" ARE GENERALLY INTERCHANGEABLE?		
9	A. I PREFER TO USE THE TERM "WEB BROWSER." OTHER PEOPLE		
10	HAVE USED THOSE OTHER TERMS. AND MY UNDERSTANDING OF HOW		
11	OTHER PEOPLE USE THOSE TERMS IS THAT THEY ARE GENERALLY		
12	SIMILAR IN MEANING.		
13	Q. AND MICROSOFT'S WEB BROWSER IS INTERNET EXPLORER, RIGHT?		
14	A. THAT'S THE NAME THAT MICROSOFT USES TO SELL THEIR WEB		
15	BROWSER, YES.		
16	Q. NOW, IN YOUR WORDS, THE PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM THAT		
17	YOU DEMONSTRATED ON THE VIDEOTAPE IS A MECHANISM FOR		
18	REMOVING WEB BROWSING FROM WINDOWS 98, RIGHT?		
19	A. YES.		
20	Q. AND WHEN IT IS ACTIVATED, THE PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM		
21	MAKES A NUMBER OF CHANGES TO WINDOWS 98, RIGHT?		
22	A. YES.		
23	Q. THOSE CHANGES INCLUDE MODIFYING THE SOURCE CODE FOR		
24	WINDOWS 98, CORRECT?		
25	A. NO, THAT'S NOT CORRECT.		

1 Q. WELL, DIDN'T YOU IMPLEMENT A NEW FILE THAT YOU CALL

2 URL.DLL?

3 A. WE DID IMPLEMENT A NEW FILE. THAT'S NOT THE NAME,

4 HOWEVER.

- 5 Q. OKAY. WELL, YOU REWROTE SOME OF THE CODE IN WINDOWS 98; 6 ISN'T THAT RIGHT?
- 7 A. WE ADDED SOME CODE, YES.
- 8 Q. AND YOU MODIFIED SOME CODE?

9 A. WE MODIFIED SOME CODE, BUT NOT BY MODIFYING THE SOURCE

10 CODE. BY ATTACHING THE BINARY.

11 Q. OKAY. FROM TIME TO TIME AS WE CONTINUE WITH THE

12 QUESTIONING, I MAY REFER TO THE VERSION OF WINDOWS 98 THAT

13 RESULTS FROM RUNNING THE PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM AS THE

14 D.O.J. VERSION OF WINDOWS 98. IF I USE THAT TERMINOLOGY,

15 WILL YOU UNDERSTAND WHAT I MEAN?

16 A. SURE, IF YOU USE IT. IT'S NOT THE TERMINOLOGY I WOULD 17 CHOOSE.

18 Q. NOW, FOR THE MOST PART, THE INTERNET EXPLORER 4 WEB 19 BROWSING SOFTWARE REMAINS IN WINDOWS 98 AFTER THE PROTOTYPE 20 REMOVAL PROGRAM IS RUN; ISN'T THAT RIGHT?

21 A. NO.

Q. WELL, LET'S TAKE A LOOK AT YOUR TESTIMONY, PARAGRAPH 54,
SIR, PAGE 18. NOW, THIS PARAGRAPH IS A SUMMARY OF THE SET
OF CHANGES THAT THE PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM MAKES TO
WINDOWS 98; ISN'T THAT RIGHT?

1 A. THAT'S RIGHT, AND IT SAYS THAT APPENDIX B CONTAINS THE

2 COMPLETE LIST.

Q. AND YOU EXPLAIN, STARTING FROM THE TOP, FIRST, THE
PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM REMOVES AN ICON, AND A PROGRAM
FILE, AND SOME OTHER FILES AND ICONS, RIGHT?

6 A. YES.

7 Q. SECOND, THE PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM -- I'M

8 PARAPHRASING -- MAKES CHANGES TO THE WINDOWS REGISTRY TO

9 PREVENT WINDOWS 98 FROM ATTEMPTING TO USE THE IE 4 WEB

10 BROWSING SOFTWARE; ISN'T THAT RIGHT?

11 A. THAT'S CORRECT. THAT'S WHAT IT SAYS.

12 Q. OKAY. SO THE IE 4 WEB BROWSING SOFTWARE IS STILL ON THE 13 SYSTEM, BUT YOU HAVE MADE SOME CHANGES TO PREVENT ITS USE; 14 ISN'T THAT RIGHT?

A. NO, THAT'S NOT WHAT I'M SAYING HERE. WHAT I'M SAYING HERE IS THAT THERE IS NO POINT IN TRYING TO USE SOFTWARE WHICH IS NOT THERE. AND SO IN ORDER TO GET AN APPROPRIATE ERROR MESSAGE, IT DOESN'T MAKE SENSE TO LOOK FOR THE SOFTWARE WHICH IS NOT PRESENT.

FOR EXAMPLE, I AM REFERRING HERE TO THE
IEXPLORE.EXE PROGRAM FILE, WHICH IS REMOVED BY THE PROTOTYPE
REMOVAL PROGRAM. TRYING TO EXECUTE THAT FILE WOULD GIVE THE
USER A CONFUSING ERROR MESSAGE. AND SO BY MODIFYING THE
REGISTRY, WE CAN CAUSE THE USER TO GET A MORE SENSIBLE ERROR
MESSAGE.

Q. NOW, DR. FELTEN, IF IT WAS A SIMPLE MATTER OF REMOVING
 ONE PROGRAM FILE FROM WINDOWS 98 AND THAT WOULD TAKE AWAY
 THE ABILITY TO ACCESS WEB BROWSING, YOU WOULD HAVE DONE
 THAT, RIGHT?

5 A. CORRECT, BUT THAT -- I DON'T SEE THE CONNECTION BETWEEN 6 THAT AND ANYTHING I'VE SAID SO FAR.

7 Q. WELL, YOU HAD TO GO TO THE NEXT STEP, BECAUSE IT'S NOT 8 ENOUGH TO SIMPLY REMOVE THE IEXPLORE.EXE FILE. YOU NEEDED 9 AS WELL TO GO INTO THE REGISTRY AND ESSENTIALLY HARDCODE 10 THINGS SO THAT IF A WEB ADDRESS WAS TYPED INTO WINDOWS EXPLORER, FOR EXAMPLE, IT WOULD RETURN AN ERROR MESSAGE? 11 A. THE REGISTRY IS NOT HARDCODING. THE REGISTRY CAN BE 12 CHANGED BY THE USER. IF THE USER WANTS TO USE IE 4, AFTER 13 THE PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM HAS BEEN RUN, THE USER IS 14 PERFECTLY FREE TO DO THAT. THEY CAN INSTALL IE 4 BY 15 DOUBLE-CLICKING THE PROTOTYPE INSTALLATION PROGRAM. THE 16 17 USER CAN USE WHATEVER WEB BROWSING SOFTWARE THEY LIKE OR NO 18 WEB BROWSING SOFTWARE AT ALL.

19 Q. NOW, FOCUSING ON THE SENTENCE THAT BEGINS "SECOND" IN 20 PARAGRAPH 54, ARE YOU DENYING HERE THIS MORNING THAT THE 21 IE 4 WEB BROWSING SOFTWARE REMAINS IN WINDOWS 98 AFTER THE 22 PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM IS RUN?

A. WHEN THE PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM HAS BEEN RUN, THE
USER IS NO LONGER ABLE TO BROWSE THE WEB. THE WEB BROWSING
IS GONE. THE WEB BROWSING FUNCTION OR THE WEB BROWSING

1 APPLICATION, WHICH ARE DIFFERENT WAYS OF SAYING THE SAME

2 THING, ARE GONE.

3 Q. RIGHT. THE SOFTWARE IS DISABLED?

4 A. GONE.

5 Q. WELL, LET ME ASK YOU THIS, DR. FELTEN. ISN'T IT TRUE 6 THAT THE D.O.J. VERSION OF WINDOWS 98 IS MORE THAN 99.9 7 PERCENT AS LARGE AS THE MICROSOFT VERSION OF WINDOWS 98? 8 A. THAT MAY BE THE CASE. AS I SAY IN MY TESTIMONY, THOUGH, 9 THE GOAL OF THE PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM IS TO DEMONSTRATE 10 THAT MICROSOFT COULD HAVE OFFERED A VERSION OF WINDOWS 98 11 THAT DID NOT CONTAIN IE WEB BROWSING.

12 AND THE CHANGES THAT THE PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM
13 MAKES ARE THOSE THAT ARE SUFFICIENT TO DEMONSTRATE THAT
14 PROPOSITION.

15 Q. THAT PROPOSITION IS NOT A STARTLING PROPOSITION, IS IT,

16 DR. FELTEN?

17 A. IT WASN'T STARTLING TO ME.

18 Q. WELL, MICROSOFT HAS DEVELOPED MANY OPERATING SYSTEMS

19 WITHOUT WEB BROWSING SOFTWARE; ISN'T THAT RIGHT?

20 A. YES, IN THE PAST.

21 Q. THERE'S MS-DOS 1 AND 2 AND 3 AND THERE'S WINDOWS 3.1,

22 RIGHT?

23 A. THAT'S CORRECT. AND MICROSOFT HAS DEVELOPED WEB

24 BROWSING -- OPERATING SYSTEM PRODUCTS THAT THEY DELIVER

25 SEPARATELY FROM THEIR WEB BROWSING PRODUCTS SO THAT THE USER

1 HAS THE CHOICE OF WHICH WEB BROWSING PRODUCT TO USE ON THOSE

2 OPERATING SYSTEM PRODUCTS.

Q. SO WHAT YOU'RE SAYING IS THAT WHEN A SOFTWARE DEVELOPER
SITS DOWN TO DESIGN A NEW PRODUCT, THE DEVELOPER HAS A LOT
OF FLEXIBILITY IN HOW HE DESIGNS THAT PRODUCT, RIGHT?
A. THAT'S CORRECT. AND THE DEVELOPER, IF HE'S DOING HIS
JOB, IS TRYING TO PASS ON AS MANY OF THOSE CHOICES TO HIS
CUSTOMERS AS HE CAN.

9 Q. THE SOFTWARE DEVELOPER CAN PUT MORE FUNCTIONALITY IN A10 PRODUCT OR LESS FUNCTIONALITY?

A. OR THE SOFTWARE DEVELOPER CAN GIVE THE CONSUMER THE
 CHOICE OF EXACTLY WHICH FUNCTIONS THEY WANT OR WHICH VENDOR
 THEY'D LIKE TO GET VARIOUS FUNCTIONS FROM. I THINK THAT'S
 REALLY THE ISSUE THAT THE PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM IS
 ADDRESSING.

16 Q. AND AFTER A SOFTWARE PRODUCT IS CREATED, WITH EITHER 17 MORE FUNCTIONS OR LESS FUNCTIONS, IT CAN BE CHANGED OVER 18 TIME, RIGHT?

19 A. CERTAINLY SOFTWARE PRODUCTS CAN BE CHANGED, YES.

20 Q. WITH ENOUGH ENGINEERING WORK, IT CAN BE DONE.

21 ONE POSSIBLE CHANGE IS THAT A DEVELOPER COULD TRY22 TO REMOVE SOME FUNCTIONALITY FROM A PRODUCT, RIGHT?

A. IF WE'RE TALKING IN A GENERAL CONTEXT, YES, A DEVELOPERCOULD TRY TO DO THAT.

25 Q. YOU COULD HIDE OR REMOVE FUNCTIONALITY IN ALMOST ANY

1 PRODUCT WITH ENOUGH EFFORT; ISN'T THAT TRUE?

2 A. ABSOLUTELY. AND IF YOUR USERS WANTED IT, THAT WOULD BE3 A GOOD THING FOR YOU TO DO.

Q. IN YOUR WRITTEN TESTIMONY, YOU DO NOT SAY THAT THE MERE
FACT THAT SOME FUNCTIONALITY CAN BE REMOVED FROM A PRODUCT
NECESSARILY MEANS THAT THAT FUNCTIONALITY IS A SEPARATE
PRODUCT, RIGHT?

8 A. THAT'S CORRECT. AND THE MERE FACT THAT SOME
9 FUNCTIONALITY IS DELIVERED ALONG WITH A PRODUCT DOES NOT
10 MAKE IT AN INTEGRAL PART OF THAT PRODUCT EITHER. THAT'S
11 JUST A QUESTION OF PACKAGING.

12 Q. BY THE WAY, NEW VERSIONS OF SOFTWARE PRODUCTS OFTEN HAVE 13 MORE FUNCTIONALITY THAN OLDER VERSIONS; ISN'T THAT RIGHT? A. YES, AND THEY OFTEN GIVE USERS MORE CHOICES THAN 14 PREVIOUS VERSIONS. FOR EXAMPLE, WINDOWS 98 GIVES THE USER 15 MORE CHOICES THAN WINDOWS 95 DID, BUT THERE'S ONE AREA IN 16 17 WHICH IT GIVES THE USER LESS CHOICE, WHICH IS WEB BROWSING. 18 Q. AND JUST COMING BACK TO THE TOP OF THE TESTIMONY FOR A 19 MINUTE, THERE'S MORE THAN TWO DOZEN WAYS TO INITIATE WEB BROWSING. AND YOUR TESTIMONY IS THAT IN ALL BUT FOUR OF 20 THOSE, WHEN NETSCAPE NAVIGATOR IS INSTALLED AS THE DEFAULT 21 22 BROWSER, NAVIGATOR WILL BE LAUNCHED; ISN'T THAT RIGHT? A. THAT'S CORRECT, BUT IT'S FURTHER MY TESTIMONY THAT THERE 23 24 IS NO TECHNOLOGICAL REASON NOT TO RESPECT THE USER'S CHOICE 25 IN THOSE OTHER CASES.

AND IF YOU RECALL PROFESSOR FARBER'S TESTIMONY, HE 1 EXPLAINED AND ILLUSTRATED WHY IT'S UNHELPFUL TO USERS TO 2 3 TAKE AWAY THAT CHOICE AND TO MAKE IE POP UP WHEN THE USER DOESN'T WANT IT. 4 5 O. I'D WOULD LIKE TO ASK YOU A FEW OUESTIONS NOW ABOUT REMOVING WEB BROWSING, AS YOU PUT IT, FROM WINDOWS 98. 6 7 THE COURT: BEFORE YOU DO THAT, LET'S TAKE A 8 TEN-MINUTE BREAK. 9 MR. HEINER: YES. THANK YOU. 10 (RECESS WAS TAKEN.) 11 (AFTER RECESS.) Q. SOMETIMES, DR. FELTEN, YOU TALK ABOUT INTERNET EXPLORER 12 13 BEING ON THE SAME DISK AS WINDOWS, SUGGESTING THAT MICROSOFT 14 MADE SOME KIND OF A PACKAGING DECISION. I WOULD LIKE TO ASK YOU, IS IT POSSIBLE TO REMOVE 15 WEB BROWSING, AS YOU PUT IT, FROM WINDOWS 98 MERELY BY 16 17 INSTALLING SOME OF THE FILES THAT ARE ASSOCIATED WITH WINDOWS 98 AND NOT OTHERS? 18 19 A. IF YOU'RE TALKING -- IF YOU'RE RESTRICTING ME TO POSSIBILITIES WHERE I INSTALL EACH FILE EITHER COMPLETELY OR 20 NOT AT ALL, THEN, NO. BUT WHAT THAT REALLY REFLECTS IS THE 21 22 WAY MICROSOFT HAS PACKAGED THEIR LINES OF CODE INTO FILES. O. SO YOU'RE SAYING THAT TO REMOVE THE WEB-BROWSING 23 24 FUNCTIONALITY FROM WINDOWS, ONE MUST GO BEYOND THE LEVEL OF 25 FILES AND GO DEEPER -- SORT OF INTO THE NEXT LEVEL OF

GRANULARITY, IF YOU WILL, INTO PROCEDURES, OR ROUTINES, OR 1 EVEN INDIVIDUAL LINES OF CODE, IS THAT RIGHT? 2 3 A. THAT'S RIGHT. AND LET ME EXPLAIN WHY. MICROSOFT 4 DEVELOPED THIS CODE, AS EVERY SOFTWARE DEVELOPER DOES, IN 5 TERMS OF FUNCTIONS OR IN TERMS OF LINES OF CODE. AND THEY 6 THEN, AS PROFESSOR FARBER DESCRIBED, TOOK THE VARIOUS 7 FUNCTIONS AND LINES OF CODE AND PACKAGED THEM TOGETHER INTO 8 THESE FILES. 9 AND PROFESSOR FARBER USED THE ANALOGY OF PUTTING 10 GROCERIES INTO A BAG. AND IT'S THE SAME SORT OF PROCESS. 11 THERE ARE MANY WAYS IN WHICH THE GROCERIES COULD BE PUT INTO 12 BAGS, AND THE PACKING OF GROCERIES INTO BAGS DOESN'T 13 NECESSARILY REFLECT ANYTHING DEEP ABOUT THE STRUCTURE OR RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE DIFFERENT GROCERIES. IT'S JUST A 14 DECISION ABOUT PACKAGING. 15 Q. WELL, LET ME ASK YOU THIS, DR. FELTEN. ISN'T IT TRUE 16 17 THAT THE REASON THAT YOU CAN'T DELETE WEB BROWSING FROM 18 WINDOWS 98 MERELY BY NOT INSTALLING SOME FILES OR BY 19 DELETING SOME FILES IS BECAUSE THE RELEVANT FILES PERFORM 20 MULTIPLE FUNCTIONS? A. THE FILES CONTAIN SEPARATE FUNCTIONS WHICH HAPPEN TO BE 21 22 PACKAGED TOGETHER. 23 Q. WELL, ISN'T IT TRUE THAT THE FILES ARE IMPORTANT TO THE 24 OPERATION OF WINDOWS 98 ITSELF FOR REASONS OTHER THAN WEB

25

BROWSING?

A. THE FILES CONTAIN CODE WHICH IS IMPORTANT FOR THOSE 1 REASONS, BUT THE FILE -- A FILE CONTAINS A BUNCH OF THINGS 2 3 AND TO SAY THAT THERE IS SOME CODE THAT IS IMPORTANT TO FUNCTION "A" AND SOME CODE IMPORTANT TO FUNCTION "B," THAT 4 5 HAPPEN TO BE PACKAGED IN THE SAME FILE, SAYS NOTHING ABOUT THE RELATION BETWEEN FUNCTION "A" AND FUNCTION "B." 6 7 O. AND THE FILES THAT WE'RE TALKING ABOUT THAT ARE RELEVANT 8 TO WEB BROWSING ALSO PROVIDE FUNCTIONS THAT THIRD-PARTY 9 SOFTWARE DEVELOPERS RELY UPON, IS THAT RIGHT? 10 A. AGAIN, THERE IS SOME CODE IN THOSE FILES THAT 11 THIRD-PARTY DEVELOPERS RELY ON. AND, AS I SAID, THE FACT 12 THAT THOSE THINGS ARE TOGETHER IN THE SAME FILE SAYS NOTHING 13 ABOUT THEIR LOGICAL RELATIONSHIP. Q. NOW, YOU SOMETIMES REFER TO SUCH FILES AS "SHARED CODE" 14 OR "SHARED PROGRAM LIBRARIES," RIGHT? 15 A. YES. 16 17 Q. AND ANOTHER TERM FOR THAT IS DYNAMICALLY LINKED 18 LIBRARIES OR DLL'S? 19 A. RIGHT. AND THOSE NAMES REFER TO THE MECHANISM THAT IS 20 USED TO LOAD THOSE FILES INTO MEMORY RATHER THAN ANYTHING ELSE. 21 22 Q. NOW, THE USE OF SUCH SHARED PROGRAM LIBRARIES, TO ADOPT 23 YOUR TERMINOLOGY, TO SUPPORT WEB BROWSING WAS SOMETHING 24 FIRST INTRODUCED WITH INTERNET EXPLORER 3, RIGHT? 25 A. I AM NOT AWARE OF ANY EARLIER USE OF IT.

1 O. OKAY. SO IN VERSIONS 1 AND 2 OF INTERNET EXPLORER,

THERE WAS A SINGLE FILE -- A SINGLE PROGRAM FILE THAT 2 3 PERFORMED MOST OF THE CORE WEB BROWSING FUNCTIONS, SUCH AS HTML DISPLAY, RIGHT? 4 5 A. IT'S MY UNDERSTANDING THAT MICROSOFT SHIPPED THEIR INTERNET BROWSING SOFTWARE IN IE 1 AND IN IE 2 PACKAGED INTO 6 7 A SINGLE FILE, YES. 8 Q. AND YOU HAVE ALREADY TESTIFIED THAT YOU CAN REMOVE THE 9 WEB BROWSER FROM WINDOWS SIMPLY BY REMOVING THAT FILE, 10 RIGHT? 11 A. IN THOSE CASES, RIGHT, THAT REFLECTS THE WAY MICROSOFT 12 PACKAGED THAT SOFTWARE AND WHAT THAT SOFTWARE DOES. 13 O. THEN MICROSOFT SUBSTANTIALLY REDESIGNED INTERNET EXPLORER FOR THE INTERNET EXPLORER 3 RELEASE SO THAT IT WAS 14 NOW COMPONENTIZED, CORRECT? 15 A. THAT'S CORRECT. AND WHAT THAT MEANS IS A CHANGE IN THE 16 17 DESIGN AND ALSO A CHANGE IN THE PACKAGING. Q. I WAS JUST GOING TO ASK YOU WHAT THAT MEANS. WHAT THAT 18 19 MEANS IS THEY BROKE UP INTERNET EXPLORER 3 INTO PIECES AND THE FUNCTIONALITY PROVIDED BY THOSE PIECES WAS THEN MADE 20 AVAILABLE TO OTHER PARTS OF WINDOWS AND TO THIRD-PARTY 21 22 SOFTWARE DEVELOPERS IN THE FORM OF SHARED PROGRAM LIBRARIES, 23 RIGHT? 24 A. THAT'S CLOSE, BUT I THINK IT'S MORE ACCURATE TO SAY THAT

THOSE SHARED PROGRAM LIBRARIES, OR DLL'S, EACH IS A PACKAGE

25

CONTAINING A BUNCH OF SEPARATE FUNCTIONS. SOME OF THE 1 FUNCTIONS INSIDE THOSE DLL'S ARE AVAILABLE FOR INDEPENDENT 2 3 SOFTWARE VENDORS TO USE AND SOME HAVE OTHER FUNCTIONS. Q. NOW, YOU KEEP TALKING ABOUT SEPARATE FUNCTIONS IN THESE 4 5 DLL'S. LET'S FOCUS IN ON THAT FOR A MINUTE AND TAKE AN 6 EXAMPLE. WINDOWS 98 INCLUDES SOFTWARE THAT ALLOWS 7 INFORMATION FORMATED IN HTML TO BE DISPLAYED, RIGHT? 8 A. CODE THAT DOES THAT IS SHIPPED IN THE BOX WITH 9 WINDOWS 98, YES. 10 Q. IT'S PART OF WINDOWS 98, ISN'T IT? 11 A. IF YOU MEAN WINDOWS 98 AS DEFINED BY MICROSOFT 12 MARKETING, YES. 13 Q. MICROSOFT IS THE COMPANY THAT DEFINES WINDOWS 98, RIGHT? A. CERTAINLY MICROSOFT IS FREE TO USE THAT TERM IN THEIR 14 MARKETING HOWEVER THEY LIKE. 15 Q. NOW, THE FUNCTION OF DISPLAYING HTML IS AN IMPORTANT 16 17 FUNCTION THAT MUST BE SUPPORTED FOR WEB BROWSING, CORRECT? A. THAT'S CORRECT, BUT IT'S NOT NECESSARY THAT THE 18 19 MICROSOFT IMPLEMENTATION OF THAT FUNCTION BE PRESENT IN 20 ORDER FOR WEB BROWSING TO OCCUR. Q. AND OTHER PARTS OF WINDOWS 98 USE HTML DISPLAY AS WELL, 21 22 ISN'T THAT RIGHT? A. OTHER CODE THAT SHIPS WITH WINDOWS 98 DOES USE HTML 23 24 DISPLAY, YES. Q. SO, FOR EXAMPLE, THE USER INTERFACE IN WINDOWS 98 RELIES 25

1 UPON THE HTML DISPLAY SOFTWARE IN WINDOWS 98, ISN'T THAT

2 RIGHT?

3 A. YES, THERE IS SOME RELIANCE THERE.

4 Q. AND THE HELP SYSTEM -- THE NEW AND IMPROVED HELP SYSTEM 5 IN WINDOWS 98 USES THE HTML SOFTWARE?

A. YES, IT DOES. AND IF YOU RECALL, MR. WEADOCK TESTIFIED
ABOUT SOME OF THE DRAWBACKS OF DOING THINGS THAT WAY, AND,
IN PARTICULAR, THE VERY LARGE AMOUNT OF MEMORY THAT IS
REOUIRED TO DO THINGS THAT WAY.

Q. NOW, MICROSOFT DESIGNED WINDOWS 98 SO THAT THIRD-PARTY
SOFTWARE DEVELOPERS CAN ALSO MAKE USE OF THAT HTML SOFTWARE,
ISN'T THAT RIGHT?

A. THAT'S CORRECT. THIRD-PARTY DEVELOPERS CAN USE WHATEVER
 HTML SOFTWARE THEY LIKE.

Q. SO WE'RE NOT TALKING ABOUT SEPARATE FUNCTIONS. WE'RE 15 16 TALKING ABOUT ONE SET OF FUNCTIONS THAT PROVIDES A VERY 17 BASIC SERVICE, WHICH IS ALLOWING WINDOWS ITSELF, OR THE 18 WEB-BROWSING FUNCTIONALITY IN WINDOWS, OR THIRD-PARTY 19 SOFTWARE DEVELOPERS, LIKE AOL, OR QUICKEN, OR LOTUS NOTES, 20 OR ANY OF THE HUNDREDS OF OTHERS TO DISPLAY DOCUMENTS IN HTML, RIGHT? 21 A. IF WE'RE TALKING ABOUT THE HTML RENDERING ENGINE THAT 22

22 A. IF WE RE TALKING ABOUT THE HIML RENDERING ENGINE THAT 23 MICROSOFT SHIPS WITH WINDOWS 98, THEN, YES. BUT IF WE'RE 24 TALKING ABOUT THE IE WEB BROWSING PRODUCT, THEN WE'RE 25 TALKING ABOUT SOMETHING ENTIRELY DIFFERENT.

Q. WELL, THE IE WEB BROWSING PRODUCT, AS YOU PUT IT, USES 1 THE HTML RENDERING ENGINE THAT WE HAVE BEEN TALKING ABOUT, 2 3 RIGHT? A. CORRECT, ALONG WITH A LOT OF OTHER SOFTWARE. ISV 4 5 SOFTWARE USES THAT HTML LIBRARY, BUT THAT DOES NOT MEAN THAT THE HTML LIBRARY IS PART OF THAT ISV SOFTWARE. 6 7 Q. OKAY. SO THE HTML LIBRARY IS SHARED AMONG MULTIPLE 8 USERS, RIGHT? A. THAT'S CORRECT, YES. THERE IS AN HTML RENDERING --9 10 THERE IS AN HTML RENDERING MODEL, WHICH IS SHARED IN THAT 11 WAY, YES. 12 Q. THAT'S THE DESIGN THAT MICROSOFT IMPLEMENTED, CORRECT? 13 A. YES. 14 Q. AND, IN GENERAL, AS A MATTER OF SOFTWARE DESIGN, SUCH CODE SHARING CAN BE EFFICIENT, ISN'T THAT TRUE? 15 A. YES, IT CAN BE EFFICIENT. PROVIDING CODE THAT PEOPLE 16 17 ACTUALLY USE IS EFFICIENT, BUT PROVIDING CODE THAT IS NOT 18 BEING USED, OR PACKAGING CODE THAT IS NOT BEING USED, OR 19 CODE THAT THE USER DOES NOT WANT ALONG WITH CODE THE USER 20 DOES WANT, AS MICROSOFT HAS DONE IN THIS CASE, IS NOT EFFICIENT AND MAKES THINGS WORSE FOR THE USERS. 21 22 Q. LET ME ASK YOU THIS QUESTION, DR. FELTEN. IF IT TURNS 23 OUT THAT THERE'S A HUNDRED APPLICATIONS IN THE WORLD ALREADY 24 THAT USE THE HTML RENDERING ENGINE IN WINDOWS, DON'T YOU 25 THINK THAT SOFTWARE OUGHT TO REMAIN IN WINDOWS?

1 AND DR. FARBER, WHOSE TESTIMONY YOU INVOKE 2 FREQUENTLY, SAID OVER AND OVER AND OVER AGAIN, "I'M NOT TALKING ABOUT REMOVING ANYTHING FROM WINDOWS AND DON'T 3 4 REMOVE ANY API'S. THAT IS A BAD IDEA." MR. MALONE: OBJECTION, YOUR HONOR. A COMPOUND 5 6 QUESTION. 7 THE COURT: SUSTAINED. BREAK YOUR QUESTION UP. 8 THERE IS NO QUESTION PENDING. 9 BY MR. HEINER: 10 Q. DR. FELTEN, SHARING CODE CAN LEAD TO BETTER PERFORMANCE, 11 ISN'T THAT RIGHT? 12 A. IN SOME CASES, YES. Q. AND THE AVAILABILITY OF CODE THAT CAN BE SHARED, SUCH AS 13 14 THE HTML SOFTWARE IN WINDOWS, IS OFTEN PART OF WHAT IS MEANT 15 BY SAYING THAT A PARTICULAR SOFTWARE PROGRAM IS A PLATFORM, 16 RIGHT? 17 A. WHEN I USE THE WORD "PLATFORM," AT LEAST ALL I MEAN IS 18 THAT THIS IS SOFTWARE THAT OFFERS API'S -- SOFTWARE THAT 19 OFFERS SERVICES TO OTHER SOFTWARE. AND WHETHER SOMETHING IS A PLATFORM OR NOT SAYS NOTHING ABOUT WHETHER IT'S PART OF 20 THE OPERATING SYSTEM, WHETHER IT HAS TO BE SHIPPED WITH THE 21 22 OPERATING SYSTEM, OR ANYTHING LIKE THAT. I DESCRIBED BEFORE 23 ALL THE THIRD-PARTY PRODUCTS WOULD SERVE AS PLATFORMS ON 24 WINDOWS. 25 Q. NOW, WHEN A SOFTWARE DEVELOPER USES A PLATFORM SERVICE,

1 THAT CAN ENABLE THE SOFTWARE DEVELOPER TO SAVE WORK, IS THAT

2 RIGHT?

A. CORRECT, REGARDLESS OF WHO OFFERS THAT PLATFORM SERVICE
AND REGARDLESS OF WHETHER ITS PACKAGED WITH THE OPERATING
SYSTEM.

6 Q. BECAUSE THEY CAN SIMPLY REUSE A CODE THAT SOMEBODY ELSE7 ALREADY WROTE?

8 A. YES, AGAIN REGARDLESS OF WHO WROTE THAT PLATFORM
9 SOFTWARE AND REGARDLESS OF WHETHER IT'S PACKAGED WITH THE
10 OPERATING SYSTEM.

Q. AND IF SOFTWARE DEVELOPERS CAN AVOID REINVENTING THE
 WHEEL REPEATEDLY, THEY MIGHT BE ABLE TO DEVELOP PRODUCTS
 MORE RAPIDLY AND MAYBE EVEN MORE CHEAPLY, ISN'T THAT RIGHT?
 A. THAT'S CORRECT.

15 Q. AND USING A COMMON SET OF PLATFORM SERVICES ALSO

16 PROMOTES COMPATIBILITY AMONG PRODUCTS, ISN'T THAT RIGHT?

17 A. I DON'T THINK THAT CONNECTION IS SO STRONG.

18 Q. WELL, LET'S LOOK AT YOUR DEPOSITION TESTIMONY ON THAT 19 POINT, WHICH IS AT PAGE 35. AND I WILL READ TO YOU ON PAGE 20 35, BEGINNING AT LINE 20 AND GOING TO PAGE 36, LINE 4.

21 "QUESTION: CAN THERE BE ANY BENEFITS FROM WRITING22 TO A PARTICULAR PLATFORM RELATING TO COMPATIBILITY?

23 "ANSWER: COMPATIBILITY WITH WHAT?

24 "QUESTION: COMPATIBILITY AMONG SOFTWARE PROGRAMS.25 "OBJECTION.

1 "ANSWER: I THINK THERE CAN BE.

2 "QUESTION: AND WHAT CAN THOSE BENEFITS BE? 3 "ANSWER: A PLATFORM CAN SERVE AS A KIND OF 4 STANDARD THAT -- AND STANDARDS OFTEN HAVE THE EFFECT OF 5 INCREASING COMPATIBILITY ALONG WITH ALL OF THEIR OTHER 6 EFFECTS." 7 DO YOU RECALL BEING ASKED THOSE QUESTIONS AND 8 GIVING THOSE ANSWERS? 9 A. YES. 10 Q. A. OKAY. IF YOU WON'T USE THE TERM "OPERATING SYSTEM" TO 20 REFER TO WINDOWS 98, THEN I WON'T OBJECT. 21 Q. I WILL TRY NOT TO. AND IF I DO, YOU WILL KNOW I MEAN 22 WINDOWS 98 AS DEFINED BY MICROSOFT. 23 24 MR. HEINER: I WOULD NOW LIKE TO PLACE BEFORE THE 25 WITNESS A DOCUMENT THAT HAS BEEN MARKED AS DEFENDANT'S

1 EXHIBIT 2088.

2 DEFENDANT'S EXHIBIT 2088 IS A BLOCK DIAGRAM 3 SHOWING CERTAIN FILES IN WINDOWS 98 THAT RELATES TO WEB 4 BROWSING. IT DOES NOT SHOW ALL OF THE FILES IN WINDOWS 98 5 THAT RELATE TO WEB BROWSING. 17 Q. THAT'S RIGHT. SO WHAT YOU'RE SAYING IS MICROSOFT TOOK 18 ITS ORIGINAL BROWSER, INTERNET EXPLORER 1.02, BROKE IT UP 19 INTO PIECES, AND THEN EXPOSED THE FUNCTIONALITY OF THOSE 20 PIECES THROUGH API'S SO THAT ANY SOFTWARE DEVELOPER CAN MAKE 21 USE OF THAT, RIGHT?

A. THAT'S NOT QUITE RIGHT. THERE'S PLENTY OF STUFF IN
THERE WHICH HAS NO RELATION AT ALL TO WEB BROWSING. FOR
EXAMPLE, THE CODE THAT IS INVOLVED IN DRAWING THE START
MENU. THAT'S NOT WEB A BROWSING FUNCTION. AND YET IT'S IN

1 THIS FILE, SHDOCVW.DLL.

2 SO AS I SAID, THESE FILES ARE PACKAGES OF STUFF. 3 AND SOME OF THE STUFF IS WEB BROWSING STUFF AND SOME IS NOT. Q. WHERE IN YOUR TESTIMONY DO YOU IDENTIFY FOR THE COURT 4 5 WHAT IT IS THAT'S IN THESE FILES THAT YOU SAY DOESN'T RELATE 6 TO WEB BROWSING? 7 A. THERE'S A DISCUSSION -- IF YOU GIVE ME A MINUTE, I CAN 8 FIND IT. 9 Q. SURE. 10 A. OKAY. IT'S IN PARAGRAPH 31. IT'S -- IF YOU BEGIN WITH 11 THE SECOND SENTENCE. THE SECOND SENTENCE IN PARAGRAPH 31 12 AND GOING ON FROM THERE, IT SAYS, "IN SOME CASES IN 13 WINDOWS 95 AND IE 4, FUNCTIONS USED IN WEB BROWSING AND 14 FUNCTIONS UNRELATED TO WEB BROWSING ARE IMPLEMENTED IN THE SAME PROGRAM FILE. THAT THESE FUNCTIONS ARE IMPLEMENTED IN 15 16 THE SAME FILE DOES NOT MEAN THE FUNCTIONS ARE INEVITABLY 17 INTERTWINED. THE SHDOCVW.DLL FILE IN OSR 2.5, FOR EXAMPLE, 18 CONTAINS A VARIETY OF FUNCTIONS, ONLY SOME OF WHICH ARE RELATED TO WEB BROWSING." AND THEN IT GOES ON TO SAY 19 20 SPECIFICALLY WHICH FUNCTIONS I'M TALKING ABOUT. Q. SO YOU HAVE GIVEN THE EXAMPLE OF THE START MENU FOR 21 EXAMPLE, RIGHT? 22 23 A. CORRECT. THAT'S ONE EXAMPLE. 24 Q. ISN'T IT THE CASE, DR. FELTEN, THAT THE VERY SAME 25 SOFTWARE IN THIS FILE, SHDOCVW, THAT PROVIDES SOME NEW

- 1 CAPABILITIES TO THE START MENU IS ALSO USED TO MAKE THE
- 2 TOOLBAR IN INTERNET EXPLORER WORK BETTER?
- 3 A. NOT THE VERY SAME SOFTWARE.

Q. NOW, THESE FOUR FILES TAKEN TOGETHER ARE SO CENTRAL TO
WEB BROWSING THAT MICROSOFT'S DOCUMENTATION FOR SOFTWARE
DEVELOPERS REFERS TO THEM AS THE WEB BROWSER CONTROL; ISN'T
THAT RIGHT?

8 A. MICROSOFT USES THAT TERM "WEB BROWSER CONTROL," AND I9 SUPPOSE THEY CAN USE IT HOWEVER THEY LIKE.

10 Q. NOW, THE PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM THAT YOU DEVELOPED 11 DOES NOT REMOVE ANY OF THOSE FOUR FILES FROM WINDOWS 98, 12 CORRECT?

13 A. CORRECT, ALTHOUGH IT MODIFIES URLMON.DLL. BUT I WILL 14 REMIND YOU THAT THE PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM IS DESIGNED TO DEMONSTRATE THAT MICROSOFT CAN ISSUE -- MICROSOFT CAN MAKE A 15 VERSION OF WINDOWS 98 THAT DOESN'T CONTAIN WEB BROWSING. 16 17 AND THE GOAL OF THE PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM WAS NOT TO SEE 18 WHETHER WE COULD REMOVE CODE FROM THESE FILES. 19 Q. IN FACT, WINDOWS 98 IS SO DEPENDENT ON THOSE FOUR FILES THAT IT WOULDN'T EVEN BOOT UP IF YOU REMOVED THEM; ISN'T 20 THAT RIGHT? 21 A. FIRST OF ALL, THAT'S NOT CORRECT. IF YOU REMOVE MSHTML, 22 IT DOES BOOT. BUT THAT ASIDE, AGAIN, YOU HAVE TO RECOGNIZE 23

24 THAT THESE FILES ARE PACKAGES. AND, YES, THERE IS SOME CODE 25 IN EACH OF THESE FILES WHICH HAS TO BE THERE IN ORDER FOR 1 WINDOWS TO BOOT, WITH THE EXCEPTION OF MSHTML.

BUT THAT DOESN'T SAY THAT EVERYTHING IN THOSE
FILES HAS TO BE THERE OR THAT EVERYTHING IN THOSE FILES IS
PART OF THE OPERATING SYSTEM.

5 O. IT SEEMS TO BE VERY CENTRAL TO YOUR TESTIMONY HERE THIS MORNING LIVE IN COURT THAT THERE'S SOME LINE OF CODE, OR 6 7 SOME PROCEDURE, OR SOME ROUTINE, OR SOMETHING IN THESE FILES 8 THAT YOU SAY COULD BE REMOVED. WHERE DO YOU TELL THE COURT 9 IN YOUR WRITTEN TESTIMONY WHAT THOSE LINES OF CODE ARE? 10 A. I DISAGREE WITH THE PREMISE OF THE QUESTION THAT I'M 11 TRYING TO SAY THAT THERE MUST BE CODE IN THERE THAT CAN BE 12 REMOVED. IT SIMPLY DOESN'T MATTER. WHAT I'M HERE TO TALK 13 ABOUT AND WHAT THE PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM SHOWS IS THAT 14 MICROSOFT CAN GIVE USERS THE CHOICE OF WEB BROWSING 15 SOFTWARE.

16 AND WE CAN TALK, IF YOU LIKE, ABOUT WHAT SPECIFIC
17 THINGS HAD TO HAPPEN IN ORDER TO MAKE THAT OCCUR, BUT
18 WHETHER YOU CAN REMOVE CODE FROM THESE FILES OR NOT IS
19 SIMPLY NOT RELEVANT TO THAT QUESTION.

20 Q. YOU SEEM TO BE TALKING ABOUT IT QUITE A BIT.

21 A. YOU'RE ASKING THE QUESTIONS.

Q. ISN'T IT THE CASE THAT YOU HAVE NO IDEA WHAT CODE IS IN
THOSE FILES THAT COULD POSSIBLY BE REMOVED WITHOUT IMPAIRING
THE FUNCTION OF WINDOWS OR THIRD-PARTY SOFTWARE PROGRAMS?
A. IT'S NOT CORRECT THAT I HAVE NO IDEA, BUT THE POINT IS

THAT I HAVE NOT DONE A DETAILED STUDY OF WHAT CODE MIGHT BE
 REMOVABLE OR NOT REMOVABLE IN THOSE FILES, BECAUSE, AS I
 EXPLAINED, IT'S JUST NOT RELEVANT TO THE QUESTIONS THAT I
 WAS ADDRESSING.

5 IF THERE'S CODE THAT'S IN THERE THAT CAN BE 6 REMOVED, THEN CERTAINLY MICROSOFT IS ABLE TO REMOVE IT. 7 Q. NOW, SIR, DO YOU SEE THE TOP TWO FILES ON THE TOP OF 8 EXHIBIT 2088, THE FILES IEXPLORE.EXE AND EXPLORER.EXE? 9 A. YES, I SEE THAT.

10 Q. EITHER OF THOSE TWO FILES CAN BE USED TO ACTIVATE THE 11 WEB BROWSING SOFTWARE IN WINDOWS, RIGHT?

12 A. YES. THE PRIMARY FUNCTION OF IEXPLORE.EXE IS TO BROWSE 13 THE WEB. IF YOU DOUBLE-CLICK THAT INTERNET EXPLORER ICON ON 14 THE DESKTOP, WHAT HAPPENS IS THAT IEXPLORE.EXE GETS RUN AND 15 A WEB BROWSING WINDOW POPS UP.

16 IF YOU ACTIVATE EXPLORER.EXE, WHAT YOU GET IS 17 WINDOWS EXPLORER, WHICH IS AN ENTIRELY DIFFERENT THING. AND 18 AS I SAID BEFORE, I DON'T BELIEVE THAT EXPLORER.EXE HAS 19 ANYTHING TO DO WITH WEB BROWSING, EXCEPT THAT YOU CAN USE IT 20 TO START THE WEB BROWSER.

Q. OKAY. AND TO BE COMPLETELY CLEAR, THE WEB BROWSING
SOFTWARE THAT IS ACTIVATED WHEN A USER CLICKS ON
IEXPLORE.EXE IS THE FOUR FILES BELOW IEXPLORE.EXE, PLUS
OTHER CODE, RIGHT?

25 A. NO, THAT'S NOT THE RIGHT CHARACTERIZATION. WHEN

IEXPLORE.EXE GETS RUN, THERE IS SOME CODE WHICH IS ACTIVATED
 OR WHICH GETS USED, AND SOME OF THAT CODE RESIDES IN THESE
 FILES. IT'S NOT CORRECT TO SAY THAT ALL THE CODE IN THESE
 FILES GETS ACTIVATED OR GETS USED.

5 AND, ALSO, AS I SAID BEFORE, THE FACT THAT A PIECE 6 OF CODE GETS USED WHEN A FUNCTION IS EXECUTED SAYS NOTHING 7 ABOUT WHETHER THAT PIECE OF CODE IS PART OF THE APPLICATION 8 THAT YOU'RE USING. IF YOU RECALL, THE CODE THAT DETECTS 9 KEYSTROKES, THAT'S NOT -- IT DOESN'T MAKE SENSE TO SAY 10 THAT'S PART OF IE, BECAUSE IT GETS USED WHEN THE USER TYPES 11 AN "H" INTO THE ADDRESS BAR.

12 Q. NOW, THE PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM REMOVES THE FILE

13 CALLED "IEXPLORE.EXE," RIGHT?

14 A. YES, IT DOES.

15 Q. AND, INDEED, THAT IS THE ONLY PROGRAM FILE THAT IS

16 REMOVED BY THE PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM, RIGHT?

17 A. THAT'S THE ONLY FILE THAT'S ENTIRELY REMOVED -- THE ONLY
18 PROGRAM FILE THAT'S ENTIRELY REMOVED. THERE ARE PLENTY OF

19 OTHER FILES THAT ARE ENTIRELY REMOVED.

20 Q. NOW, IN THE PARLANCE OF SOFTWARE DEVELOPERS, THE FILE

21 IEXPLORE.EXE IS JUST A STUB LOADER, RIGHT?

22 A. I'M NOT SURE I WOULD USE THAT TERMINOLOGY.

Q. YOU'RE AWARE THAT GLENN WEADOCK TESTIFIED HERE AND HE
USED THAT TERMINOLOGY "STUB LOADER." DO YOU DISAGREE WITH
THE CHARACTERIZATION OF THE FILE IEXPLORE.EXE AS BEING A

- 1 STUB LOADER?
- 2 A. ARE YOU REFERRING TO A PARTICULAR PLACE IN HIS
- 3 TESTIMONY.
- Q. WELL, I AM. I'M REFERRING TO -- AND WE CAN PLACE IT
 BEFORE YOU IF WE HAVE IT -- TRIAL TRANSCRIPT VOLUME 15 ON
 OCTOBER 16, 1998, THE P.M. SESSION, AT PAGE 69, LINES 6 TO
 14.
- 8 A. I'M SORRY.
- 9 Q. ON PAGE 69.
- 10 A. PAGE 69.
- 11 Q. LINE 6 TO 14.
- 12 A. OKAY.
- Q. AND I'LL READ IT WITH YOU AND THEN THE QUESTION WILL BEDO YOU DISAGREE WITH HIS CHARACTERIZATION.
- 15 "QUESTION: "NOW, IEXPLORE.EXE, I THINK WE CAN 16 AGREE, IS JUST A STUB LOADER, CORRECT?
- 17 "ANSWER: IT'S A SMALL PROGRAM THAT CALLS OTHER18 SOFTWARE INTO MEMORY.
- 19 "QUESTION: BUT YOU WOULD DESCRIBE THAT PROGRAM AS
 20 A STUB LOADER, WOULD YOU NOT, SIR?
- 21 "ANSWER: YES. FROM A TECHNICAL STANDPOINT, IT'S
 22 A STUB LOADER. FROM THE USERS' STANDPOINT, IT'S WHAT ALLOWS
 23 THEM TO RUN THE PROGRAM."
- 24 DO YOU AGREE THAT IEXPLORE.EXE IS JUST A
- 25 STUB LOADER?

A. NO, I DON'T AGREE WITH THAT TERMINOLOGY. I SHOULD POINT 1 2 OUT TO YOU THAT MR. WEADOCK WAS NOT APPEARING AS AN EXPERT 3 IN SOFTWARE DESIGN. Q. THAT'S RIGHT. YOU'RE THE EXPERT FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF 4 5 JUSTICE ON THE DESIGN OF WINDOWS 98, RIGHT? A. WELL, I SAY IN MY TESTIMONY WHAT I AM HERE TO TALK 6 7 ABOUT, BUT WHAT I'M SAYING IS THAT MR. WEADOCK DID NOT 8 REPRESENT HIMSELF AS AN EXPERT IN SOFTWARE DESIGN. 9 O. AND DR. FARBER DID NOT REPRESENT HIMSELF AS AN EXPERT IN 10 THE DESIGN OF WINDOWS 98 EITHER, DID HE? 11 A. WE'D HAVE TO LOOK AT HIS TESTIMONY TO KNOW EXACTLY HOW 12 HE REPRESENTED HIMSELF. 13 Q. NOW, THE FILE IEXPLORE.EXE IS A VERY SMALL FILE, ISN'T 14 IT? A. I DON'T RECALL THE EXACT SIZE. 15 Q. WELL, WOULD IT SURPRISE YOU TO LEARN THAT IT'S JUST 64 16 17 KILOBYTES? 18 A. THAT MIGHT BE ABOUT RIGHT. 19 Q. AND ALL OF WINDOWS 98 AT RETAIL IS 134 MEGABYTES, RIGHT? A. I DON'T KNOW. 20 Q. NOW, DR. FELTEN, YOU SAID THAT THE PROTOTYPE REMOVAL 21 22 PROGRAM REMOVES IEXPLORE.EXE. AFTER THAT OCCURS, USERS COULD STILL BROWSE THE WEB WITH WINDOWS 98 RUNNING THROUGH 23 24 THE OTHER FILE AT THE TOP OF THE EXHIBIT, EXPLORER.EXE; 25 ISN'T THAT RIGHT?

1 A. AFTER THE PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM HAS BEEN RUN, NO.

Q. I'M TALKING IT ONE STEP AT A TIME NOW, JUST AS YOU DID
IN YOUR TESTIMONY IN THE PARAGRAPH WE LOOKED AT, WHICH I
THINK MIGHT HAVE BEEN PARAGRAPH 54. THE FIRST STEP WAS YOU
REMOVED THE FILE CALLED IEXPLORE.EXE.

6 MY QUESTION IS, STOPPING JUST AT THAT STEP, IT IS 7 TRUE, ISN'T IT, THAT CUSTOMERS COULD STILL BROWSE THE WEB IN 8 WINDOWS 98 COMING THROUGH THE CODE PATH THAT BEGINS WITH 9 EXPLORER.EXE?

A. I DON'T THINK I SUGGESTED THAT THERE WAS A LIST OF STEPS
AND THAT THE USER MIGHT STOP AFTER ONE STEP. I LISTED WHAT
THE PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM DOES. AND YOU NECESSARILY
HAVE TO LIST THE THINGS ONE AT A TIME. YOU CAN'T LIST THEM
ALL AT THE SAME TIME.

Q. IT'S A SIMPLE ENOUGH QUESTION, DR. FELTEN. TAKING THE 15 FILE IEXPLORE.EXE AND REMOVING IT FROM WINDOWS 98 STILL 16 17 LEAVES IN WINDOWS 98 WEB-BROWSING FUNCTIONALITY, RIGHT? A. THAT'S CORRECT. IF YOU DO SOME OF THE STEPS IN THE 18 19 PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM, YOU'LL GET SOME OF THE RESULTS. 20 THERE'S NOTHING UNIQUE ABOUT THE PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM IN THAT RESPECT. IF YOU DO ONLY SOME OF THE STEPS OF 21 INSTALLING MICROSOFT WORD, YOU'LL GET ONLY SOME OF THE 22 FUNCTIONS OF MICROSOFT WORD. 23

Q. DOES THE PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM REMOVE THE FILEEXPLORER.EXE THE WAY IT DOES WITH IEXPLORE.EXE?

A. NO. THE PRIMARY FUNCTION OF THAT FILE IS TO SUPPORT
 WINDOWS EXPLORER, WHICH, AS I'VE EXPLAINED, IS NOT A WEB
 BROWSING FUNCTION.

4 Q. OKAY. SO ONCE AGAIN, THE FILE EXPLORER.EXE PERFORMS
5 MULTIPLE FUNCTIONS, AND SO IT MAKES SENSE TO LEAVE IT IN THE
6 SYSTEM, RIGHT?

A. THE REASON THAT IT'S LEFT IN THE -- WELL, THERE ARE TWO
REASONS WHY IT'S LEFT IN THE SYSTEM. FIRST OF ALL, IF YOU
RECALL, THE GOAL OF THE PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM WAS TO
DEMONSTRATE THAT MICROSOFT COULD OFFER A VERSION OF
WINDOWS 98 THAT RESPECTED THE USER'S CHOICE OF BROWSER. AND
THE PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM ACHIEVED THAT GOAL WITHOUT
REMOVING THAT FILE.

14 SECOND, AS I SAID, THAT FILE -- THE PRIMARY 15 PURPOSE OF THAT FILE IS NOT WEB BROWSING. IT IS USED TO 16 LAUNCH THE WINDOWS EXPLORER FUNCTION AND THAT'S NOT A WEB 17 BROWSING FUNCTION. THERE'S NO REASON TO TAKE THAT FILE 18 AWAY. NOT ONLY WAS IT NOT NECESSARY, THERE IS NO MOTIVATION 19 FOR EVEN WANTING TO.

20 Q. WELL, A CUSTOMER CAN GO INTO WINDOWS EXPLORER, WHICH IS
21 SUPPORTED BY EXPLORER.EXE, RIGHT --

22 A. CORRECT.

Q. -- AND TYPE A WEB ADDRESS INTO THE ADDRESS BAR, AS YOU
SHOWED IN THE VIDEOTAPE; ISN'T THAT RIGHT?

25 A. YES, AND AS I DESCRIBED IN THE VIDEOTAPE, THAT LAUNCHES

THE WEB BROWSER. THERE'S NOTHING SO SPECIAL ABOUT WINDOWS
 EXPLORER IN THIS RESPECT. THERE ARE PLENTY OF THINGS YOU
 CAN DO TO LAUNCH THE WEB BROWSER, LIKE DOUBLE-CLICKING THE
 ICON ON THE DESKTOP.

Q. SO INSTEAD OF REMOVING EXPLORER.EXE, WHAT YOU DID WAS TO
CHANGE SOME OF THE CODE ELSEWHERE IN WINDOWS TO PREVENT
CUSTOMERS FROM BEING ABLE TO USE THAT FILE TO BROWSE THE
WEB, RIGHT?

9 A. NO. THAT'S, I THINK, INACCURATE IN TWO WAYS. FIRST OF
10 ALL, THAT FUNCTION IS -- THAT PROGRAM IS A LOCAL FILE
11 MANAGER PROGRAM; IT'S NOT A WEB BROWSER PROGRAM.

12 AND, SECOND, THE GOAL WAS NOT TO PREVENT USERS 13 FROM DOING ANYTHING. THE GOAL WAS TO GIVE THE USERS THE 14 CHOICE TO HAVE IE, TO HAVE NAVIGATOR OR TO HAVE NO WEB 15 BROWSING AT ALL ON THEIR SYSTEM.

16 Q. WELL, YOU DID TESTIFY EARLIER THAT THE EFFECT OF THE 17 PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM WAS TO REMOVE WEB BROWSING FROM 18 WINDOWS, RIGHT?

A. CORRECT. AND USERS WHO WANT TO REMOVE WEB BROWSING
COULD USE THE PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM, OR USERS WHO WANT
TO USE AN ALTERNATIVE WEB BROWSER COULD USE IT. BUT THE
POINT REALLY IS TO DEMONSTRATE THAT -- IS THAT IT'S A
DEMONSTRATION THAT MICROSOFT COULD OFFER WINDOWS 98 IN A WAY
THAT SUPPORTED THE USER'S CHOICE IN THIS WAY.

25 Q. NOW, AFTER THE PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM IS RUN, NEARLY

1 ALL OF THE WINDOWS 98 SOFTWARE THAT SUPPORTS WEB BROWSING

2 REMAINS ON THE SYSTEM, RIGHT?

3 A. NEARLY ALL OF THE WINDOWS 98 SOFTWARE THAT SUPPORTS ANY4 FUNCTION IS STILL ON THE SYSTEM.

5 Q. INCLUDING ALL THE WEB BROWSING SUPPORT, RIGHT?

6 A. NOT INCLUDING ALL THE WEB BROWSING SUPPORT. WE TALKED 7 BEFORE ABOUT THIS DISTINCTION BETWEEN CODE THAT'S USED WHEN 8 A FUNCTION IS EXECUTED, LIKE THE CODE THAT DETECTS THE 9 LETTER "H" WHEN IT'S TYPED, AND CODE THAT'S PART OF AN 10 APPLICATION, AND THERE'S AN IMPORTANT DISTINCTION THERE.

11 Q. OKAY.

12 A. THE APPLICATION IS GONE, AS I DESCRIBED BEFORE.

13 O. ALL THOSE FOUR FILES THAT WE DISCUSSED -- THE FOUR BOTTOM FILES ON THE EXHIBIT -- REMAIN IN WINDOWS 98, RIGHT? 14 THEY DO REMAIN, ALTHOUGH, AS I SAID -- ALTHOUGH URLMON 15 Α. 16 IS MODIFIED. AS I SAID, THAT'S NOT THE SAME THING AS SAYING 17 THAT THOSE FILES CONTAIN WEB BROWSING CODE. AND IT'S NOT 18 THE SAME THING AS SAYING THAT THOSE FILES CONTAIN ENTIRELY 19 WEB BROWSING CODE OR THAT THEY ARE PART OF THE WEB BROWSER. 20 Q. IN FACT, AS YOU HAVE REDESIGNED THINGS IN WINDOWS 98, YOU CAN STILL USE WINDOWS 98 TO BROWSE ONE SITE ON THE WEB, 21 22 RIGHT?

23 A. CAN YOU REPEAT THE QUESTION?

Q. AS YOU REDESIGNED WINDOWS 98, THE EFFECT OF RUNNING THE
PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM, WINDOWS 98 CAN STILL BE USED TO

1 BROWSE ONE SITE ON THE WEB; ISN'T THAT RIGHT?

2 A. WELL, I DON'T AGREE WITH THE IMPLICATION THAT I

3 REDESIGNED WINDOWS 98.

4 Q. WELL, LET ME REPHRASE IT. AFTER THE PROTOTYPE REMOVAL
5 PROGRAM IS RUN, WINDOWS 98 CAN STILL BE USED TO BROWSE ONE
6 SITE ON THE WEB; ISN'T THAT RIGHT?

A. I DON'T THINK THAT'S A SENSIBLE THING TO SAY TO BROWSE
ONE SITE. EITHER YOU'RE BROWSING THE WEB OR YOU'RE NOT.
Q. WELL, WINDOWS 98 CAN BE USED TO ACCESS ONE SITE ON THE
WEB AND VIEW THE CONTENT OF THAT SITE; ISN'T THAT RIGHT?
A. NO, I DON'T THINK THAT'S ACCURATE.

12 Q. THE WINDOWS UPDATE SITE, SIR? I THINK YOU SHOWED IT TO13 US ON THE VIDEOTAPE.

A. AFTER THE PROTOTYPE HAS BEEN RUN, THE WINDOWS UPDATE 14 FEATURE, THE WINDOWS UPDATE FUNCTION, THE ABILITY TO UPDATE 15 16 THE FILES ON THE USER'S SYSTEM IS STILL THERE. AND I'LL 17 NOTE THAT MICROSOFT ITSELF IN ONE OF THE PLEADINGS IN THIS 18 CASE CLASSIFIED WINDOWS UPDATE AS A NON-INTERNET FUNCTION. 19 THERE WAS A PLEADING WHICH WAS -- I'M NOT A LAWYER HERE, SO 20 I MAY GET THE LINGO WRONG -- SOMETHING LIKE A PROPOSED SET OF FACTS THAT MICROSOFT SAYS THERE IS NO DISAGREEMENT ABOUT. 21 AND IN THAT SET OF FACTS, MICROSOFT GAVE THREE 22 LISTS OF FUNCTIONS WHICH, AS MICROSOFT PUT IT, ARE 23

24 IMPLEMENTED BY INTERNET EXPLORER TECHNOLOGY. I BELIEVE THAT

25 WAS THE TERM THEY USED. AND THERE WAS ONE LIST WHICH WAS

"USER INTERFACE" OR "SHELL FUNCTIONS." THERE WAS ONE LIST
 THAT WAS "INTERNET FUNCTIONS," AND THERE WAS ONE LIST THAT
 WAS "OTHER." AND WINDOWS UPDATE WAS ON THE "OTHER" LIST,
 NOT THE "INTERNET" LIST.

5 Q. YOU CALL WINDOWS UPDATE A WEB SITE IN YOUR TESTIMONY, 6 RIGHT?

7 A. I DID USE THOSE WORDS. I DON'T THINK IT'S THE MOST8 ACCURATE CHARACTERIZATION.

9 Q. BUT ALL I'M ASKING, SIR, IS ISN'T IT TRUE THAT AFTER THE 10 PROTOTYPE REMOVAL PROGRAM IS RUN, WINDOWS 98 INCLUDES ALL 11 THE SOFTWARE IT NEEDS TO ALLOW A CUSTOMER TO ACCESS AND VIEW 12 THAT PARTICULAR WEB SITE? I THINK YOU MADE A POINT OF 13 TESTIFYING TO THAT IN WRITING.

A. IT MAKES -- WINDOWS 98 HAS EVERYTHING IT NEEDS TO HAVE 14 TO LET THE USER DO THE WINDOWS UPDATE FUNCTION, TO LET THE 15 USER DOWNLOAD THE NEW SOFTWARE AND SO ON. AS I EXPLAINED IN 16 17 MY TESTIMONY, IT WOULD BE -- WE COULD HAVE -- THE PROTOTYPE 18 REMOVAL PROGRAM COULD HAVE BEEN IMPLEMENTED SO AS TO REMOVE 19 THAT FUNCTION, BUT THERE SEEMED NO REASON TO DO IT. Q. WE HAVEN'T TALKED ABOUT THE OSR 2 VERSION OF WINDOWS 95. 20 LET'S JUST TAKE A MINUTE ON THAT NOW. YOU TESTIFIED THAT 21 22 INTERNET EXPLORER 3 IS REMOVABLE FROM OSR 2, RIGHT? A. CORRECT, AND MICROSOFT PROVIDES IN THEIR KNOWLEDGE BASE 23 24 A NUMBER OF ARTICLES THAT EXPLAIN HOW TO DO THAT. AND 25 THAT'S THE TERM THAT MICROSOFT'S OWN UNINSTALLATION UTILITY

1 USES TO DESCRIBE WHAT'S HAPPENING, AS YOU SAW IN THE

2 VIDEOTAPE.

Q. BUT IT'S TRUE, ISN'T IT, THAT REMOVING INTERNET
EXPLORER 3, THE WAY YOU SHOWED ON THE VIDEOTAPE, LEAVES ALL
OF THE SHARED PROGRAM LIBRARIES THAT SUPPORT WEB BROWSING IN
OSR 2, RIGHT?

7 A. REMOVING IE 3, LIKE REMOVING ANY APPLICATION, WHEN A 8 USER CLICKS THAT "ADD/REMOVE PROGRAMS" ITEM TO SAY "I WANT 9 TO REMOVE THIS THING, " WHAT HAPPENS IS WHATEVER THE 10 MANUFACTURER OF THAT APPLICATION WANTS TO HAVE HAPPEN. THAT 11 IS, WHAT HAPPENS WHEN THE USER CLICKS THAT BUTTON IS EXACTLY 12 WHAT MICROSOFT PROGRAMMED THE IE 3 UNINSTALLER TO DO. Q. MY QUESTION IS SIMPLY ISN'T IT TRUE THAT THE SHARED 13 14 PROGRAM LIBRARIES ARE LEFT IN OSR 2 UNDER THE DEINSTALLATION PROCEDURE THAT YOU DEMONSTRATED ON THE VIDEOTAPE? 15 A. I DON'T RECALL PRECISELY. 16 17 THE COURT: WOULD THIS BE AN APPROPRIATE TIME TO 18 BREAK FOR THE NOONTIME RECESS? 19 MR. HEINER: IT WOULD BE, YOUR HONOR. YES, IT

20 WOULD. THANK YOU.

21 THE COURT: WE WILL RECONVENE AT 2:00 O'CLOCK.

22 (WHEREUPON, THE ABOVE-ENTITLED MATTER WAS RECESSED23 FOR LUNCH.)
